

Village hosts large recycling and document destruction event

The Village of Hoffman Estates, in partnership with the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC), will host a free one-day recycling drop-off and document destruction event



In addition to electronics, the Village will be accepting these items for recycling:

- Expired drugs/sharps
- Fluorescent and compact fluorescent lamp (CFL) light bulbs
- Batteries
- Printer cartridges

- Latex (water-based) paint (small fee):
 - Quarts: \$2
 - One-gallon containers: \$3.50
 - Two-gallon buckets: \$5
 - Five-gallon buckets: \$10

Document destruction and electronics recycling

There is no cost to attend, but this event is for residents of SWANCC-member communities only, and proof of residency is required.

Lead poisoning dangers

If your home was built before 1978, it likely contains some lead-based paint.

Lead is a highly toxic metal. When absorbed into the body, it can cause damage to the central nervous system and vital organs, such as the brain, kidneys, nerves and blood cells. Some symptoms of lead poisoning include headaches, stomachaches, tiredness and irritability. Children under the age of six are especially vulnerable. Lead can harm kids without causing obvious symptoms. They can become lead poisoned by putting their hands or other lead contaminated objects into their mouths.



Paint containing lead was previously used on the inside and outside of homes because of its durability. If you live in a home constructed prior to 1978 and you see peeling, flaking or chipping paint, you may be at risk. Keep dust to a minimum, wash your hands and the hands of children often, and pick up any paint chips, wiping surfaces after their removal. State law requires property owners to correct lead-based paint hazards if a child living in the home tests positive for lead poisoning.

Materials from businesses, institutions or schools will not be accepted. If you cannot come to the Hoffman Estates recycling day, you may attend any SWANCC recycling event (proof of residency required). Visit www.swancc.org for more collection dates.

All paper, including medical records, bank statements and retired tax forms, is shredded on site by Accurate Document Destruction, a division of Groot Industries, Inc., and all electronics will be recycled by Com2 Recycling Solutions. For more information about these companies, visit www.shredd.net or www.com2recycling.com.

Metal binders and clips should be removed. Residents will be limited to six grocery-size paper bags or file-size boxes of documents. Do not bring paper in plastic bags.



Drive to the Public Works Center, and workers will unload the recyclables from your car.

Accepted items include:

- Computers and computer equipment/components
- Printers, scanners, copy machines and fax machines
- Microwaves
- Small home appliances (e.g., toasters, blenders,
- Cellphones, PDAs and tablets
- Stereos and MP3 players
- Cameras and camcorders
- Landline phones and answering machines
- Power tools and cords
- TVs (no wood) and VHS, DVD and CD players (no tapes or discs)
- DVRs. cable and satellite receivers, and converter boxes
- Videogame consoles

Do NOT bring humidifiers/dehumidifiers, air conditioners, vacuum cleaners, refrigerators and other large home appliances.

10 facts about **storm water**

- 1. Storm water comes from rainfall.
- 2. Storm water that does not soak into the ground becomes surface runoff.
- 3. Runoff becomes polluted as it runs along roads, parking lots, roofs, lawns and construction sites.
- 4. Runoff contains pollutants, such as automotive fluids, fertilizers and pesticides, leaves, sediment, litter, and pet waste.
- 5. The polluted surface runoff flows into a storm sewer that eventually flows into waterways (ponds, creeks and rivers).
- 6. Runoff is NOT treated before it enters the waterways.
- 7. Storm sewers are designed to collect water from sidewalks, parking lots and streets to prevent flooding.
- 8. Everyone can help reduce the amount of rubbish and pollution carried in storm water.
- 9. Please do your part to keep storm water clean!
- 10. Report illegal dumping or spills by calling the Public Works Department at 847-490-6800, or, in the case of an emergency, call 9-1-1.

Barrington Square Town Center

Background: Built in 1973 as an enclosed mall, Barrington Square is now an outdoor community gathering place for events and commerce. Located along Higgins Road just east of Barrington Road, the center was originally anchored by Robert Hall Village, then Kmart in 1980, which was later renovated for Menards in 1993. The home improvement store was torn down in 2008, and the land is now available for development opportunities. The longtime owners of the center recently upgraded the parking lot, façade and courtyard of the center, and the occupancy rate is now up to 95 percent.



Development in the center: 2016 has been a busy construction season on both the north and south sides of Barrington Square. A new McDonald's, which accommodates the fast food giant's new look and drive-thru format, is now open in an outlot adjacent to Buona Beef along Higgins Road. On the north side of the center, a new 25,000-square-foot medical office building was constructed behind the bowling alley facing Hassell Road. There remains room for more development on both the former Menards and Burger King lots.

<u>In the news</u>: The center has been home to longtime businesses like Poplar Creek Bowl and Garibaldi's, which just celebrated its 40th anniversary in the Village. As of 2014, the center is the national headquarters of GiGi's Playhouse, who's founder, Nancy Gianni, was named a 2016 CNN Hero! Barrington Square also hosts great community events, including a Cruise Night every Monday night from June through September in the parking lot near Buona Beef.

Thinking about building a swimming pool?

Here are a few of the basic requirements to keep in mind if you are thinking about installing a swimming pool on your property this summer:

- A building permit is required for swimming pools 24 inches or more in depth, or those that hold 1,000 gallons or more of water, which includes spas and temporary pools.
- Swimming pools should be at least 5 feet from any building, and at least 10 feet from the rear and side lot line.
- All building permit applications require the submission of your property plat of survey.
- A fence or barrier may be required if existing fences do not meet existing safety standards.
- Before a permit is issued, a Village inspector will conduct an onsite inspection to ensure that setback requirements are met, that electrical lines do not pose a safety threat and to inspect existing fences.

Cholestech: complete lipid profile

This test measures total cholesterol, HDL, LDL, triglycerides and glucose levels. It requires a small drop of blood. Results are immediate, and include consultation with a nurse. To schedule an appointment, call 847-781-4850. The cost is \$22.

Upcoming child and youth clinics

Two affordable child immunization clinics are offered each month at the Village Hall (main entrance). The clinics are intended for children who are underinsured (health insurance does not cover immunizations) or do not have health insurance. The cost is \$8 per shot for residents of Hoffman Estates and Schaumburg, and \$10 for all other communities (cash, check or AllKids accepted). Shot records are required for children to receive an immunization. To schedule an appointment, call 847-781-4850.

Back-to-school anxiety

The transition back to class can be a stressful time for children and parents alike. Starting a new school year can make kids nervous, especially if there are changes from the previous year, such as a new school, teacher or peers. Some shyness or worry about schedules, schoolwork or friends is natural during the back-to-school transition, but ongoing withdrawal or worries may signal a problem.



In order to ease anxiety, start your child on a school-day routine well before the school year starts. Go to school several times with your child. Arrange playdates with classroom friends prior to the start of school. And try to come up with some sort of reward your child can earn for separating from parents to attend school.

Ask the Nurse

- **Q:** I thought only babies and kids needed vaccines?
- A: To stay protected against serious illnesses, like the flu, measles and pneumonia, adults need to get their shots just like kids do. Adults may be encouraged to get certain vaccines due to their age, job, hobbies, travel or health conditions. Health and Human Services offers a variety of vaccines for adults and kids at a reduced cost. A Children's Clinic is offered on the first Monday of each month, and a Baby Clinic is offered on the second Tuesday of each month. This August, we're also providing a "Back-to-School" clinic to provide vaccines to students before they head back to class. Adult vaccines are by appointment only. 2016 Citizen Fire Academy now accepting recruits


Does the thought of climbing a 100-foot ladder excite you? Would you like to use the "Jaws of Life" to cut through a car? Have you ever dreamed about leading a fire company into a burning building? If so, then the Hoffman Estates Fire Department would like to invite you to its 17th Citizen Fire Academy.

The Citizen Fire Academy is an opportunity for residents of the Village to experience and learn about the inner workings of their Fire Department. Not only will you get the chance to participate in the exciting opportunities listed above, you will also learn about home fire safety, CPR, the tactics and strategies of firefighting, and the history of the Hoffman Estates Fire Department in a fun, relaxed environment.

Applicants must be at least 18 years old, and reside, attend school or work in Hoffman Estates. Classes will meet on Wednesday

evenings from 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. at Fire Station 24, located at 5775 Beacon Pointe Drive. The academy starts on Sept. 7 and ends on Nov. 9. Class size is limited, and spots fill up quickly.

Are your kids going away to college soon?

With the new school year approaching, many parents will be sending their children to college. Something that may be overlooked in the transition from life at home to living in a dorm is fire safety.

From 2005 to 2009, U.S. fire departments responded to an average of 3,840 structure fires in dormitories, fraternities and sororities each year, which resulted in three civilian deaths, 38 civilian fire injuries and \$20.9 million in direct property damage, annually.

The leading cause of these fires was due to cooking equipment. The most common time that the fires occurred was between 5 p.m. and 11 p.m.



To make sure that your children have a safe and happy college experience, it's important to follow the following fire prevention tips:

- Never leave cooking unattended on a stove or hot plate
- In microwaves, use only containers designed for microwave use
- Keep your stovetop and oven clean and clear
- Keep combustible materials away from a stove or hot plate
- Wear tight-fitting clothing or roll up your sleeves when cooking to avoid catching the clothes on fire
- Turn pot handles inward so they can't be bumped or pulled over
- If a small fire starts in a pan, carefully slide a lid over the pan to smother the flames, turn off the burner and leave the lid in place until the pan is completely cool
- NEVER pour water on a grease fire

It is also important to make sure that their dorm has a working smoke detector. Your kids should have an escape plan from their dorm. Make sure they discuss this with their roommates.

Electrical safety

Flipping a light switch. Plugging in a coffeemaker. Charging a laptop computer. These are second nature for most of us. Electricity makes our lives easier. However, we need to be cautious and keep safety in mind.

Safety tips

- Have all electrical work done by a qualified electrician.
- When buying or remodeling a home, have it inspected by a qualified inspector.
- Only use one heat-producing appliance (e.g., coffee maker, toaster, space heater, etc.) plugged into an outlet at a time.
- Major appliances (e.g., refrigerators, washers, dryers, stoves, air conditioners, etc.) should be plugged directly into a wall outlet. Extension cords and plug strips should not be used.
- Consider having arc-fault circuit-interrupters (AFCIs) installed in your home.
- Ground-fault circuit-interrupters (GFCIs) should be installed in bathrooms, kitchens, garages and

- basements. All outdoor receptacles should be GFCI-protected.
- Test AFCIs and GFCIs once a month to make sure they work properly.
- Check electrical cords to make sure they are not running across doorways or under carpets. Have a qualified electrician add more outlets so you don't have to use extension cords.
- Use light bulbs that match the recommended wattage on the lamp or fixture. There should be a sticker that indicates the maximum wattage to use.

Call a qualified electrician if you have:

- Frequent problems with blowing fuses or tripping circuit breakers
- A tingling feeling when you touch an appliance
- · Discolored or warm wall outlets
- A burning or rubbery smell coming from an appliance
- · Flickering or dimming lights
- Sparks from an outlet
