Historian's notebook

Final deadline for free rain barrels

The free rain barrel program, administered by the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District (MWRD), will close at the end of December. Residents can receive up to four 55-gallon rain barrels through this program. Finally, after years of research, we now know who built the Lion Bridge, located at the southeast corner of Route 59 and Golf Road in western Hoffman Estates. His name was Harry L. Emerson, and he was an engineer who worked for Cook County at the turn of the previous century. Not only did he build our beautiful little bridge, he also engineered the first reinforced concrete arch bridges in Cook County.

I have to thank Randy Schallau who discovered Harry L. Emerson's name while investigating the mystery of our bridge. Randy previously lived in Hanover Park, and had read about our difficulty in finding any information about the bridge. Research is a hobby of his now that he's retired from construction work. He knew that bids for work in the construction of buildings, roads and bridges could be

found in the *Engineering News* publication, which dates all the way back to the late 1800s. He located me, and emailed what he had found. That was a great day!

The request for bids for the Lion Bridge was in the 1906 issue of *Engineering News*.

According to Mr. Emerson's biography in the *History of Cook County* from 1909, he also designed the Dundee Road Bridge in Wheeling in 1905. It was identical to our Lion Bridge, only longer, as it crossed the Des Plaines River. The Dundee Road Bridge was later widened, which destroyed the decorative ornamentation in the process. All that's left are photos at the Wheeling Historical Society and Museum.

As far as we know, none of Mr. Emerson's original bridges remain except for the Lion Bridge. I'm now in the difficult process of applying for National Register of Historic Places status.

The Lion Bridge was important because dairy farmers would take it across Poplar Creek to reach Bode Road. Bode Road is one of the oldest roads in this area. Farmers would travel along Bode Road with wagons loaded with milk bound for the dairies in Elgin.

Join us on Saturday, Dec. 3, at 10 a.m. at the Lion Bridge to celebrate its 110th birthday! A small parking area is located at the northeast corner or Bode Road and Route 59, and we'll tailgate with coffee and donuts, walk down to the bridge, and sing happy birthday to our beloved landmark.

Public Works gears up for winter

The Public Works Department subscribes to a certified local meteorological firm that monitors conditions and weather patterns that are forecast to affect the Village. This provides for the timely and efficient deployment of key personnel and required equipment. Major streets are plowed first, then side streets and culs-de-sac. Please remember:

- There is no parking allowed on Village streets for eight hours after a two-inch snowfall until the street has been cleared
- Do not shovel snow into the street or onto a fire hydrant
- Remind children building snow forts to stay away from the street

Hoffman Plaza

Background: Located along the east side of Roselle Road between Golf and Higgins roads, Hoffman Plaza was the first commercial shopping center in Hoffman Estates built by Jack Hoffman in 1959. Various sections were remodeled and added in 1972, including Jewel-Osco and Denny's, with more outlots added in 1973 and 1975 along Golf and Higgins roads. Ownership has changed several times over the years, but the 171,000-square-foot center was most recently purchased in 2013 by the Sterling Organization.



Refreshing look: With the vacancy of a night club and Dania furniture, Sterling looks to remodel and reconfigure the shopping center to give it a new look, which should make it more marketable to retailers, as well as provide shoppers with a wider array of premium businesses. The new center will be anchored by a large apparel retailer with room for other tenants, as well as outlot space for new stores and restaurants. Because development plans are not finalized, there is still an opportunity for new businesses to come to the center. If you have a store or restaurant suggestion, contact the Economic Development office who will work with Sterling to reach out and make a deal. The owner hopes to begin work in the spring of 2017.

Who's there: Due to the remodeling, businesses in the center are changing, so drive by often to see who is the new store on the block!

Cholestech: complete lipid profile

This test measures total cholesterol, HDL, LDL, triglycerides and glucose levels. It requires a small drop of blood. Results are immediate, and include consultation with a nurse. To schedule an appointment, call 847-781-4850. The cost is \$22.

Upcoming child and youth clinics

Two affordable child immunization clinics are offered each month at the Village Hall (main entrance). The clinics are intended for children who are underinsured (health insurance does not cover immunizations) or do not have health insurance. The cost is \$8 per shot for residents of Hoffman Estates and Schaumburg, and \$10 for all other communities (cash, check or Medicaid* accepted). Shot records are required to receive an immunization. 

Christmas tree disposal

There are two options for recycling your "live" Christmas trees and wreaths:

Curbside pickup

Christmas tree collection is scheduled on regular service days for the first two weeks of January 2017. Please remember that all lights, ornaments, garland and artificial decorations must be removed from the tree, plastic disposal bags are prohibited, and one disposal sticker must be visibly wrapped around the tree trunk or branch. Flocked trees are acceptable. Wreaths and garland made of pine boughs or other organic materials will also be accepted,

provided the wiring and plastic have been removed. These items should be placed in a Kraft yard waste bag with a disposal sticker attached. Leftover yard waste and bags of leaves will also be accepted, provided the required disposal sticker is attached to each bag or bundle of material. Yard waste stickers are available at local retailers, the Village Hall and on the Village's website.

Drop-off sites

Christmas trees and greenery can also be dropped off at no charge anytime between Monday, Dec. 26, and Friday, Jan. 6, 2017, at the Public Works Vehicle Maintenance Facility, 2405 Pembroke Ave., the field next to Fire Station 23, 1300 Westbury Drive, and the field next to Fire Station 24, 5775 Beacon Pointe Drive. Signs will direct residents to drop-off areas at all locations.

Christmas tree safety

According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), Christmas tree fires cause approximately 14 deaths, 26 injuries and \$13.8 million in property damage annually. These helpful Christmas tree tips can help make your holiday season safer.

Picking the tree

- Choose a tree with fresh, green needles that do not fall off when touched.
- If you have an artificial tree, make sure it's identified as fire retardant by the manufacturer.
- Pre-lit artificial trees should have the Underwriters Laboratories Inc. (UL) mark.

Placing the tree

- Before placing the tree in the stand, cut one to two inches from the base of the trunk.
- Make sure the tree is at least three feet away from any heat source, including fireplaces and candles.
- Make sure the tree is not blocking an exit.
- Add water to the tree stand daily.

Decorating the tree

- Avoid placing breakable ornaments or ones with small, detachable parts on lower branches where small children or pets can reach them.
- Do not hang popcorn chains or candy canes on the tree if you have small children. They may think other ornaments are also edible.

Lighting the tree

- Use lights that have been tested by UL.
- Replace any string of lights with worn cords or loose bulb connections.
- Never use lit candles on a tree.

Disposing the tree

Get rid of the tree when it begins
dropping needles. Trees should
not be left in the home or garage, or placed outside against
the house. *See the Christmas
tree disposal article above for
more information.
