The Village's new Sustainability Plan was created with assistance from a Metropolitan Mayors Caucus/AmeriCorps program dedicated to sustainability initiatives.



Don't shovel snow **into the street**

Historian's notebook

Did you know that shoveling snow onto a street that has been previously cleared creates a safety hazard? It is also a violation of the Village's Municipal Code. Snow pushed back onto a cleared roadway can refreeze and get compacted by traffic, which may result in ice buildup.

6-2-1 HE-11-1309: Snow Removal

- A. It shall be unlawful to deposit on public sidewalks or public streets any snow which accumulated upon and is removed from an adjacent private property or from the area between adjacent road line and curb line of the street.
 - B. It shall be unlawful to deposit snow on or against any fire hydrant which accumulated upon and was removed from any property.
 - C. It shall be unlawful to deposit any snow upon any parking place designated for handicapped persons which accumulated upon and was removed from any property.

Be a good neighbor, and shovel snow away from the street! Where has all the time gone? The beginning of a new year makes us look back on what we accomplished in 2019. As one who loves history, I still have questions about my family from years gone by. Some questions will never be answered because I never took the time to ask when my parents were still with me.

If you make one resolution this year, I hope it's to begin asking those questions now. Take time to make a list of all the things you've wondered about. Ask your family while they're still with you.

Don't forget about the pictures! Do you have some of your family from years ago, but don't have a clue as to who those faces are? Ask about them. Write the info on the back of the photo very lightly with a soft pencil. If someone new looked at your pictures in a few years, would they know who was in them?

Some of the most treasured items in our Hoffman Estates history are our photos. They really represent all the wonderful residents who have donated them. They tell the story of how our Village has grown over the years.

The farmers who moved away and some who have passed away also shared their old photos from their farming years. The equipment in the pictures was their pride and joy – new technology that helped them with their crops. Some of them date back to 1906 and 1912 when photography was just beginning to tell their story and preserve their history.

During the snowy winter days ahead, sort through those old photos. Ask questions about who's in them and mark them for future generations. Ask family members to share their photos and to digitize them. Keep your originals in special boxes made for that purpose.

Ask your parents and grandparents for their old photos and organize them, asking that all-important question: "Who is that?"

Time slips by so quickly. Begin writing your own biography. Your stories will complement the photos you have. Some people keep a daily diary; other have no desire to do so, but take a little time every now and then to write about YOU. Your family members can be encouraged to do the same. Don't wait until the person with the answers is gone. Have fun saving your history, and please remember to share your photos with me so that you become part of the Village's fascinating and storied history.

After all, isn't that what we all are?

Get to know ... the **Youth Commission**

What is the history of the commission?

The Youth Commission was established in order for young people in Hoffman Estates to become more involved in their community and local government. Originally, the commission oversaw the Peer Jury program, but that is now organized by the Hoffman Estates Police Department. Over the past 10 years, the commission has emphasized creating programming that focuses on building skills in science, technology, engineering, art and mathematics (STEAM).

What types of activities does the commission plan?

The Youth Commission hosts events for children and teens that are family-focused, enhance STEAM skills and promote community. Events are designed to give participants the opportunity to learn in a natural way – through creativity, exploration and critical thinking. The commission hosts events across various developmental levels. Some of the most popular events include children's arts and crafts events, two annual science shows, ALICE computer animation classes, Sphero BOLT robotics programs and the new esports league in partnership with Northern Illinois University.



How can people get involved?

The best way to get involved with the Youth Commission is to come to one of their monthly meetings held on the third Thursday of every month at 6:30 p.m. in the Health and Human Services conference room at the Village Hall. Residents who are interested can also attend a number of fun, family events and consider joining the commission.

Free holiday light recycling

Reminder: you can drop off your old and broken holiday string lighting and extension cords at the Village Hall lobby during normal business hours. This free program for residents ends on Friday, Feb. 7.

Holiday garbage collection schedule

There will be no change to garbage and recycling collection on Monday, Dec. 30 (residents north of the Tollway), but Wednesday collection will be delayed one day to Thursday, Jan. 2 (residents south of the Tollway, including households west of Bartlett Road). Christmas tree collection is scheduled for the first two weeks of January and a yard waste sticker is required (attached to the tree trunk or a branch). Remember that all lights, ornaments and garland must be removed from the tree. Natural wreaths and garlands will also be accepted, provided the wiring has been removed. Plastic disposal bags are prohibited. These items should be placed in a Kraft yard waste bag with a disposal sticker attached. Yard waste stickers can be purchased at the Village Hall. Keep fire hydrants clear of snow

During the winter months, firefighters face many issues when responding to structure fires, including locating fire hydrants buried in snow. It may take firefighters several minutes to dig out a hydrant in order to use it. Homeowners: keep the fire hydrant on your parkway clear of snow and other debris yearround. This is a great help to the members of the Hoffman Estates Fire Department.



Questions to Code

Q: Which extension cord types should be used for outdoor holiday lighting and outdoor equipment, such as snow blowers?

A: Use extension cords that are UL listed, labeled for outdoor use and feature a grounding (third) prong. Outdoor extension cords have durable insulation to protect them from sunlight, moisture and changes in temperature. Keep in mind that extension cords are intended for temporary use only (90 days maximum) and are not designed to take the place of permanent wiring. Extension cords will break down over time, especially after repeated use. Inspect these cords regularly and be sure to repair or replace them immediately upon noticing any damage to the plastic coating, missing or loose prongs, or other signs of wear. When not in use, extension cords should be rolled in large loops and stored so that they are not kinked or crushed.

Village budget sets **priorities for 2020** and beyond

The Village of Hoffman Estates' FY2020 Operating and Capital Budget was approved in early December 2019. The operating budget includes funding for services to be provided to the community in 2020, while the capital budget is an eight-year plan for significant projects the Village plans to accomplish. Together, the documents establish a firm financial foundation for long-term success.

For the seventh consecutive year, the Village's property tax levy for operations remains flat. The overall levy for 2020 increases 4.3% due to an increase in public safety pension costs.

The Village Board continues to focus on investment in Village neighborhoods. For FY2020, the Village has established a \$7.4 million street program, including an expanded resurfacing plan impacting 33 street segments, as well as full reconstruction of five roadways.

The Village continues its focus on economic development, with building permits for new and expanding businesses within Hoffman Estates projected to increase in FY2020. Over the next 12 months, construction continues on the redevelopment of the former AT&T campus into a mixed-use "Metroburb," comprised of office, retail and residential components. A vision

for sustainable future growth of the Village will also be articulated in FY2020 through the development of a new Comprehensive Plan. The Village demonstrates its commitment to public safety by actively recruiting new police officers and firefighters to replace those retiring, as well as ensuring that all public safety employees have the best training available. Technology and equipment will also continue to be modernized to ensure the efficient and effective delivery of Village services, including more mobile computing capability.

The FY2020 budget for all funds totals \$148,677,010. Revenues to the General Fund, the Village's primary operating fund, are projected to increase by \$1,979,310 (3.4%) from the FY2019 budget, reflecting an improved economy and increased development activity. The Village is projecting an increase of \$4,138,520 (7.1%) in General Fund expenditures from the FY2019 budget, primarily related to utilizing fund reserves to invest in capital.

The Village's balanced FY2020 budget continues its strong focus on efficiently delivering essential services while also proactively planning for the future.


Boards and


