

Free holiday light recycling

The Village of Hoffman Estates and the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC) are once again accepting holiday lights for recycling at no cost to residents from Monday, Dec. 7, through Friday, Feb. 5, 2021.

All string lighting and extension cords can be dropped off during normal business hours in the Village Hall lobby.

Late October and early November 1960 were the original move-in dates for the families on my street in the Highlands neighborhood. Not many of those people are still in their homes – many moved on.

The month of giving, December brings back all the memories of years gone by. How I remember the excitement over the delivery of our Sears catalog. It came early enough for my kids to have it in tatters by mid-December. From week to week, as the holidays approached, their Christmas lists were constantly changing.

My kids also talked about their Jewish classmates who celebrated Hanukkah, telling me that they received a gift on each of the eight days of the Festival of Lights. "Boy, they're lucky," was their response when I told them they would only get gifts on Christmas morning.

Where to shop for all those gifts was a challenge.

Hoffman Estates was such a small community back then, that most of our shopping had to be done in Elgin, where you could get gifts at Spiess, Ackemann's and Sears departments stores – the only ones close by. Or, you could drive to Rolling Meadows for a very nice department store called Crawford's.

Sears was familiar to me, but the other two felt different because of the brands they sold. I still remember the Sears store as being very old with wood floors that creaked when you walked up and down the aisles. They always had what I needed.

I do remember some of the early stores in downtown Hoffman Estates that helped me with my shopping. Brass & Glass (now Fabbrini's Flowers) in the Rose Arcade next to the Thunderbird Movie Theater in the Golf Rose Shopping Center (now Golf Center) is our oldest continuous business

in Hoffman Estates. Walgreen Agency Snyder Drugs and Jewel, the first grocer to open in Hoffman Estates in 1959, also helped with some gifts.

How life has changed for all of us this year. With a vicious virus that won't allow us the freedoms we have always enjoyed, shopping will be done online for many of us. We will always have our family traditions that we can modify and reconfigure for 2020.

Pace wins 2020 **APTA Innovation Award**

The American Public Transportation Association (APTA) recently honored Pace with its 2020 Innovation Award. Given to a public transportation leader whose accomplishments and innovations have greatly advanced public transportation, Pace won this year for their collaborative I-90 Market Expansion Project, the largest service expansion in the agency's history.

The APTA Innovation Award acknowledges public transportation systems that demonstrate innovative concepts or effective problem-solving techniques not previously applied in the public transportation industry.

Pace Suburban Bus partnered with the Illinois Tollway to work on expanding transit, delivering roadway improvements and improving overall mobility on the Jane Addams Memorial Tollway (I-90). Planning for the Tollway's investment in rebuilding and improving I-90 became a coordinated effort with Pace's plans for its I-90 Market Expansion Project.



The many transit and transportation improvements delivered on I-90 resulted from multiple coordinated planning efforts not only between Pace and the Illinois Tollway, but also the Illinois Department of Transportation, Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning, RTA and the Village of Hoffman Estates. Improvements included the state's first highway-based bus rapid transit station at Barrington Road in Hoffman Estates.

"Hoffman Estates is proud to be home to our state's first inline bus rapid transit station," said Mayor McLeod. "We enthusiastically supported this project and believe the economic development opportunities it creates will benefit our community for years to come."

The collaboration between Pace and the Illinois Tollway is a high-profile model of what can be accomplished when transit and transportation agencies work together.

Holiday garbage collection schedule

Garbage and recycling collection for both Monday, Dec. 21, and Wednesday, Dec. 23, is unaffected by the holidays, and will still take place on the regularly scheduled pickup days. There will also be no change the following week (New Year's holiday). Christmas tree collection is scheduled for early January, and a yard waste sticker is required. Turn to page 6 for more details.

Keep fire hydrants visible

The Public Works Department tries to ensure that fire hydrants are repainted once every three to five years to help maintain good visibility. Employees power washed and repainted over 1,375 hydrants in the summer of 2020. Try to clear snow away from hydrants for easier accessibility, should they be needed in an emergency. If you see a damaged or leaking hydrant, call Public Works at 847-490-6800.



Rental license renewals due mid-January

Renewal letters for the Jan. 1 through Dec. 31, 2021, Residential Rental License Program year have been mailed, and license fees must be received by mid-January 2021 in order to remain in compliance with the Village's Municipal Code. Payments can be made by mail, in person or online by visiting www.hoffmanestates.org/epay. Please pay on time, as late payments will be assessed a penalty equal to 25% of the license fee. Notification will be sent when it is time for the annual inspection to be scheduled. For questions about the program, or if you are a tenant and are unsure whether the property you are renting has been licensed, email rentalhousing@hoffmanestates.org or call 847-781-2650.

Storing your recreational equipment

Residents storing their boats, campers, trailers and other recreational equipment for the winter are reminded that there are several regulations that must be observed. Recreational equipment stored in a front yard or side yard adjacent to a street must be parked on a permitted concrete or asphalt driveway. Recreational equipment stored in a side yard or backyard must be parked on crushed stone, gravel, brick pavers or on driveway surface. At no time can any boat, trailer, camper or other recreational equipment be parked on grass or block the sidewalk. If you have any questions about recreational equipment storage regulations, call the Code Enforcement Division at 847-882-2631.

Recycle textiles with Simple Recycling

The Village has partnered with Simple Recycling to offer residents a convenient way to dispose of unwanted textiles and small home goods, while keeping these items out of the landfill. Residents of single-family homes in Hoffman Estates can recycle all types of used or new clothing, boots and shoes, belts and ties, handbags, hats and gloves, toys, towels, sheets and blankets, small kitchen appliances, and more. Simply place the items in the supplied orange bags (or any plastic bag clearly labeled for Simple Recycling), place the bags at the curb on your normal garbage and recycling collection day, and Simple Recycling's trucks will pick them up, free of charge. Residents are also encouraged to continue donating usable items to local charities. To request bags, report missed pick-ups and to learn more, call 866-835-5068 or visit www.simplerecycling.com.



Leash your pets!

The Village's Municipal Code states that animals, including dogs and cats, need to be under proper control. When animals are not on their owner's property, they must be on a leash no longer than 6 feet and under the control of a responsible person. No animal is allowed to run at large in the Village at any time, and the owner is responsible for removal and sanitary disposition of any waste from the animal(s) anywhere in the Village. Prevent your pet from becoming a public nuisance!



Healthy body, healthy mind ... news from Health and Human Services

The safety of the Hoffman Estates community is important to the Health and Human Services Department. The Village is monitoring the COVID-19 pandemic closely and will continue to update guidance based on current recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the World Health Organization (WHO). Adult services and immunizations

Health and Human Services offers health screenings and preventative tests.

- · Blood pressure and pulse check: free!
- Diabetes (blood sugar): \$2 *New lower price!
- Hemoglobin (anemia): \$3

To schedule health screenings, preventative tests, or affordable vaccines and tuberculosis testing, call 847-781-4850.

Cholestech: complete lipid profile

This <u>FASTING</u> test measures total cholesterol, HDL, LDL, triglycerides and glucose levels. It requires a small drop of blood. Results are immediate and include consultation with a nurse. To schedule an appointment, call 847-781-4850. The cost is \$22.

Hemoglobin A1C screening

The hemoglobin A1C test is a simple finger stick to find out if you have diabetes or are at risk of developing diabetes. The test takes six minutes and the cost is \$15. To schedule an appointment, call 847-781-4850.

Children's clinics

Health and Human Services currently hosts baby and children's vaccination clinics. These clinics have always used exceptional infection control policies, but they now institute additional guidelines, as suggested by the CDC, the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH), and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA). These added safety measures will help to ensure the health of patients, as well as protect Village employees.

Health and Human Services is offering **individual appointment times** for each child. The following precautions are also in place:

- Appointments will be staggered to promote social distancing
- A new COVID-19 questionnaire will be answered by each individual
- Temperature checks will be done prior to appointment time
- Face coverings/masks will be required for anyone over the age of 2
- Only one parent per child while inside the Village Hall is encouraged
- Additional hand sanitizing stations have been placed throughout the Village Hall
- All immunizations will be discussed with families by nurses via telephone before appointments
- Credit card payments (if necessary) will be done via telephone
- Staff will be required to wear additional personal protective equipment (PPE)

Ways to prevent the flu

Influenza is a contagious respiratory illness. Symptoms can appear from one to four days after being exposed to someone with the flu. Every year, there are millions of people who get infected with the flu. The Illinois Department of Public Health offers the following tips to protect yourself and decrease the spread of the flu:

- Mask up: cover your nose and mouth with a mask when out in public
- Lather up: wash your hands frequently with soap and water
- Sleeve up: roll up your sleeve to get a flu shot
- Back up: keep 6 feet of distance between you and others

During COVID-19, everyone is encouraged to do their part to avoid the flu. The CDC recommends the flu vaccine for everyone 6 months and older. The Village has four-strain flu vaccines for children, adults and seniors. Vaccines will be given to healthy individuals in a safe environment. For more information, call 847-781-4850.

Christmas tree disposal

There are two options for recycling your Christmas trees and wreaths:

Curbside pickup

Living Christmas trees (including flocked trees) will be picked up on your regular Groot service day for the first two weeks of January 2021. Remember that all lights, ornaments, garlands and artificial decorations must be removed from the tree; plastic bags are prohibited; and one disposal sticker must be visibly wrapped around the tree trunk or branch. Wreaths and garlands made of pine boughs or other organic materials (with the wiring and plastic removed) will also be accepted. These items should be placed in a yard waste bag with a disposal sticker attached. During the first two weeks of January 2021, Groot will also accept any remaining yard waste bags of leaves/ twigs with a disposal sticker attached. Yard waste stickers are available at local retailers, the Village Hall and on the Village's website. For more information, contact Code Enforcement at 847-781-2631.



Free drop-off sites

Christmas trees and greenery can also be dropped off at no charge anytime between Saturday, Dec. 26, and Friday, Jan. 8, 2021, at the following locations (look for drop-off signs):

Winter holidays are a time for families and friends to get together. But that also means a greater risk for fire. Following a few simple tips will ensure a happy and fire-safe holiday season.

A HOLIDAY DECORATING

- Be careful with holiday decorations. Choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame retardant.
- Keep lit candles away from decorations and other things that can burn.
- Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect.
- Use clips, not nails, to hang lights so the cords do not get damaged.
- Keep decorations away from windows and doors.



HOLIDAY ENTERTAINING

- Test your smoke alarms and tell guests about your home fire escape plan.
- Keep children and pets away from lit candles.
- Keep matches and lighters up high in a locked cabinet.
- Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the stovetop.
- Ask smokers to smoke outside. Remind smokers to keep their smoking materials with them so young children do not touch them.
- Provide large, deep ashtrays for smokers. Wet cigarette butts with water before discarding.



Before Heading Out or to Bed

Blow out lit candles when you leave the room or go to bed. Turn off all light strings and decorations before leaving home or going to bed.

FACTS

- More than one-third of home decoration fires are started by candles.
- More than two of every five decoration fires happen because decorations are placed too close to a heat source.

Barrington Road/I-90 interchange sub-area plan

The new full Tollway interchange and Pace's I-90 transit station at Barrington Road and I-90 are located in the heart of Hoffman Estates.

The Village has hired Farr Associates to study this area, assess its potential and develop a framework for future redevelopment. Farr Associates hosted a Visioning Charrette in early October to obtain feedback from area residents, property owners, businesses and other stakeholders.

Based on this feedback, a final sub-area plan is being finalized, which will be presented to the Village Board in the coming months.

Lather up!

We've all been told that washing our hands with soap and water is the best way to get rid of germs. Although we know the importance of proper hand washing, studies prior to COVID-19 have shown that many of us do not do it correctly.

Here are some surprising facts about handwashing:

- Only 5% of people wash their hands properly
- 30% of people don't use soap
- 20% of people do not dry their hands
- Most people wash their hands for only six seconds
- 39% of people do not wash their hands after sneezing, coughing or blowing their nose
- Handwashing rates are higher in the mornings than evenings



According to the 11th annual Healthy Handwashing Survey, Americans are now washing their hands more often and for a total of 20 seconds during the pandemic. Proper handwashing is essential to prevent the spread of viruses.

The CDC has some handwashing tips:

- 20 seconds of lathering and scrubbing with soap and water is needed to remove germs
- Handwashing with plain soap and water will remove most bacteria
- Using antibacterial soap has not shown any added health benefits
- Both warm and cold soapy water will remove the same amount of germs
- Dry your hands germs spread easier when your hands are wet
- Hand sanitizer or hand sanitizing wipes with 60% alcohol will kill bacteria and viruses on your hands
- Baby wipes do not remove germs and are not recommended for
 use on hands.
- Disinfecting wipes can irritate hands and should only be used to kill germs on surfaces

National Handwashing Awareness Week is Dec. 1 through Dec. 7. How you wash your hands can make a difference in your health and the health of others!

Park District wins award for Poplar Creek Trail System Project
