Police Chief Ted Bos and Fire Chief Patrick Fortunato both retired from the Village of Hoffman Estates in late November.

Chief Bos began his law enforcement career in January 1985, and served the community for more than 35 years. He rose steadily through the ranks, being promoted to sergeant in 1997, lieutenant in 2002 and assistant chief in 2011. Bos has been the chief of police for the Hoffman Estates Police Department since 2015. He served in all divisions of the department during his long tenure, including patrol, community relations, tactical and investigations.

Chief Fortunato proudly served Hoffman Estates for more than 30 years. He was hired by the fire department in 1990, along with eight other new firefighter/paramedics, to support

the rapidly developing area in the western part of the Village. Fortunato was promoted to lieutenant in 1999, captain in 2006, battalion chief in 2013, deputy chief in 2017 and fire chief in 2018. He was active in many divisions throughout his career, including hazardous materials, inspections and information technology. He also spearheaded a state-of-the-art station alerting system, which has increased the precision and efficiency of the department's response to emergency calls.

Both Bos and Fortunato were known for their integrity on the job and their dedication to the community. The Village wishes them the best in their retirement!

Don't shovel snow **into the street**

Historian's notebook

Did you know that shoveling snow onto a street that has been previously cleared creates a safety hazard? It is also a violation of the Village's Municipal Code. Snow pushed back onto a cleared roadway can refreeze and get compacted by traffic, which may result in ice buildup.

6-2-1 HE-11-1309: Snow Removal

A. It shall be unlawful to deposit on public sidewalks or public streets any snow which accumulated upon and is removed from an adjacent private property or from the area between adjacent road line and curb line of the street.

- B. It shall be unlawful to deposit snow on or against any fire hydrant which accumulated upon and was removed from any property.
 - C. It shall be unlawful to deposit
 any snow upon any parking place
 designated for handicapped persons
 which accumulated upon and was
 removed from any property.

Be a good neighbor, and shovel snow away from the street! Taking care of everyday business with our bank is quite easy today. With online banking, many of us haven't walked into a physical building in quite a while. I still like to visit with the people at my bank face-to-face, and I have formed friendships this way. They're always there when I need to take care of any special business.

In the early years of the Village, we had no bank of our own. It wasn't until Dec. 11, 1968, that the state banking authority granted a permit to organize the Suburban Bank of Hoffman Estates in the Golf Rose Shopping Center (now Golf Center).

The organizers were Benjamin C. Getzelman of Elgin; Charles E. Brown of Algonquin; Gerald F. Fitzgerald of Palatine; John R. Hughes of Palatine; and Raymond A. Fleming of Hoffman Estates.

The bank moved into a temporary location in a storefront

in the Golf Rose Shopping Center on the northwest corner of Golf and Roselle roads. It opened its doors at 9 a.m. on Monday, June 23, 1969. Hours were typical for banks back then: 9 a.m.-3 p.m. on Mondays and Thursdays, closed on Wednesdays, with longer hours on Thursday nights when it stayed open till 8 p.m. Thursday night was when most stores stayed open into the evening. Bank hours on Saturday were from 9 a.m.-noon.

The Suburban Bank of Hoffman Estates only did business in this original storefront for 10 months. The new bank building was ready for its grand opening. The bank, designed by the architectural firm of Mayes, Williams and Partners, was unique in many ways. The building's six sides made it one of a kind in the Village. The front doors of this hexagonal-shaped structure didn't face Roselle Road, but

toward the shopping center, welcoming everyone in and making it more convenient to exit. Three of the six sides also had drive-up windows. This allowed you the convenience of banking by car, but with a personal touch - you could drive right up to the window and talk to a helpful bank teller about your business transaction, not through a distant intercom where you couldn't talk confidentially. The building's design also featured a small canopy over each drive-up window.

As you drive past or visit the BMO Harris Bank today, you can still see this unique design.

I'll be writing more about our first bank that is now 50 years old in my February column.

Donation, recycling boxes at the Village Hall

Did you know that the Village offers donation and recycling opportunities for many materials year-round at the Village Hall? These efforts benefit a number of nonprofit organizations and partner agencies. You can drop off the following during normal business hours at the Village Hall:

- Donate non-perishable food for area Township food pantries
- Donate used eyeglasses to benefit the Schaumburg-Hoffman Lions Club
- Recycle small electronics (e.g., cell phones) and printer cartridges to benefit Recycling Avenue, a nonprofit serving adults with developmental disabilities
- Recycle rechargeable and lithium-ion batteries (regular alkaline batteries do not need to be recycled – please tape battery contacts)
- Recycle compact fluorescent lamp (CFL) and fluorescent lights at the Village
 Hall customer service counter (incandescent bulbs do not contain mercury and
 are not accepted in this program)
- Recycle string lights and extension cords seasonally (this year's program runs through Feb. 5)



New expansion enables

behavioral health hospital

to serve new patients

Over the past 20 years, AMITA Health Alexian Brothers Behavioral Health Hospital at 1650 Moon Lake Blvd. in Hoffman Estates has grown from a small community hospital, serving fewer than 50 patients per day, to the seventh largest behavioral health hospital in the United States. The hospital now serves nearly 400 patients daily and more than 10,000 patients each year.

At a time when the need for behavioral health services has never been greater, the significant growth of the hospital has created the need for additional space to serve patients. In collaboration with the AMITA Health Foundation, the AMITA Health Alexian Brothers Behavioral Health Hospital recently announced a new 15,000-square-foot expansion.







The new expansion will serve adult patients with mood disorders, substance use disorders, eating disorders and anxiety/OCD. The expansion will offer state-of-the-art group rooms with technology, comfortable spaces for physicians and staff to meet with patients, and a demonstration kitchen to work with patients suffering from eating disorders.

First installment property tax bills online

To help property owners can plan their finances for 2021, next year's first installment Cook County property tax bills are available at www.cookcountytreasurer.com. The first installment tax year 2020, which is 55% of the previous year's total tax, is due March 2. However, the Cook County Board waived late charges through May 3.

Holiday garbage collection schedule

The New Year holiday will not affect garbage and recycling collection, which will occur on the regularly scheduled pickup days the weeks of Dec. 28 and Jan. 4. Christmas tree collection is scheduled for the first two weeks of January, and a yard waste sticker is required (attached to the tree trunk or a branch). Remember that all lights, ornaments and garland must be removed from the tree. Natural wreaths and garlands will also be accepted, provided the wiring has been removed. Plastic disposal bags are prohibited. These items should be placed in a Kraft yard waste bag with a disposal sticker attached. Visit www.groot.com for more information.

Reminder: you can drop off your old and broken holiday string lighting and extension cords at the Village Hall lobby during normal business hours. This free program for residents ends on Friday, Feb. 5.



Keep fire hydrants clear of snow

During the winter months, firefighters face many issues when responding to structure fires, including locating fire hydrants buried in snow. It may take firefighters several minutes to dig out a hydrant in order to use it. Homeowners: please keep the fire hydrant on your parkway clear of snow and other debris year-round. This is a great help to the members of the Hoffman Estates Fire Department.



Unemployment insurance identity theft fraud

The Hoffman Estates Police Department, along with other surrounding suburbs, has seen a large number of fraud reports related to unemployment benefits. If you have received a debit card in the mail or are notified by your employer that unemployment benefits have been applied for in your name, call the Illinois Department of Employment Security at 800-814-0513 or visit their website at www.illinois.gov/ides immediately and report the claim as fraud. Do not activate any debit card received in the mail and do not contact KeyBank and provide them with any personal information. Destroy any debit card, request a free credit report from www.annualcreditreport.com and review your credit for other instances of fraud. If other fraud is detected, contact the police department and report the fraud.

Healthy body, healthy mind ... news from Health and Human Services

The safety of the Hoffman Estates community is important to the Health and Human Services Department. The Village is monitoring the COVID-19 pandemic closely and will continue to update guidance based on current recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the World Health Organization (WHO). Adult services and immunizations

Health and Human Services offers health screenings and preventative tests.

- · Blood pressure and pulse check: free!
- Diabetes (blood sugar): \$2
- Hemoglobin (anemia): \$3

To schedule health screenings, preventative tests, or affordable vaccines and tuberculosis testing, call 847-781-4850.

Cholesterol screening

This <u>FASTING</u> test measures total cholesterol, HDL, LDL, triglycerides and glucose levels. It requires a small drop of blood. Results are immediate and include consultation with a nurse. To schedule an appointment, call 847-781-4850. The cost is \$22.

Hemoglobin A1C screening

The hemoglobin A1C test is a simple finger stick to find out if you have diabetes or are at risk of developing diabetes. The test takes six minutes and the cost is \$15. To schedule an appointment, call 847-781-4850.

Children's clinics

Health and Human Services currently hosts baby and children's vaccination clinics. These clinics have always used exceptional infection control policies, but they now institute additional guidelines, as suggested by the CDC, the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH), and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA). These added safety measures will help to ensure the health of patients, as well as protect Village employees.

Health and Human Services is offering **individual appointment times** for each child. The following precautions are also in place:

- Appointments will be staggered to promote social distancing
- A new COVID-19 questionnaire will be answered by each individual
- Temperature checks will be done prior to appointment time
- Face coverings/masks will be required for anyone over the age of 2
- Only one parent per child while inside the Village Hall is encouraged
- Additional hand sanitizing stations have been placed throughout the Village Hall
- All immunizations will be discussed with families by nurses via telephone before appointments
- Credit card payments (if necessary) will be done via telephone
- Staff will be required to wear additional personal protective equipment (PPE)

HPV is a common virus that is usually spread through sexual contact. The best way to avoid infection is to get vaccinated before the start of any sexual activity. The CDC recommends males and females 11 to 12 years old get two doses of the vaccine to protect against cancers caused by HPV. Health and Human Services offers the vaccine to those who qualify. Village budget looks for recovery in 2021 and beyond

The Village of Hoffman Estates' FY2021 Operating and Capital Budget was approved in early December 2020. The operating budget includes funding for services to be provided to the community in 2021, while the capital budget is an eight-year plan for significant projects the Village intends to accomplish. Together, the documents establish a firm financial foundation for long-term success.

The uncertainties associated with the CO-VID-19 pandemic created unique challenges as the Village prepared the FY2021 budget. Regardless of the state of the economy, the Village remains focused on maintaining essential services, while ensuring the continued health and safety of our residents and employees.

For the eighth consecutive year, the Village's property tax levy for operations will remain flat. The overall levy for 2021 will increase by 4.9% due to an increase in public safety pension costs.

The Village Board continues to focus on investment in Village neighborhoods. For FY2021, the Village has established a \$5.5 million street revitalization program, including resurfacing 25 street segments, as well as full reconstruction of seven additional roadways.

The Village continues to demonstrate its commitment to public safety by actively recruiting

new police officers and firefighters as long-term employees retire. We are also working to ensure that all public safety employees have the best training available, while upgrading technology and equipment to continue the efficient and effective delivery of Village services.


The FY2021 budget for all funds totals \$139,933,430. Revenues to the General Fund, the Village's primary operating fund, are projected to increase by \$436,230 (0.7%) from the FY2020 budget. While the Village is optimistic that consumer-driven revenues will begin to recover in 2021, the FY2021 budget remains conservative in its projections. The Village is projecting a decrease of \$524,650 (-0.8%) in General Fund expenditures from the FY2020 budget, primarily related to reducing the amount of fund reserves used for capital projects.

The FY2021 budget continues to advance the Village Board's goals for the community. Neighborhood investments include a robust street revitalization program, ongoing water and sewer capital improvements, and storm water system improvements. The new budget addresses current fiscal challenges, while ensuring that the Village of Hoffman Estates continues to provide high-quality services to its residents, businesses and other stakeholders.

- Worried about loss of support systems
- Difficulty sleeping
- Worsening of mental health
- Increased use of alcohol and/or drugs
- Worrying about finances
- Chronic health problems worsening
- Crying frequently
- Having trouble remembering things



Here are some ways to cope with increased anxiety and worry:

- Take care of your basic needs, including eating healthy and drinking water
- Get enough sleep
- Relax your body as much as possible, and take time to breathe
- Talk to friends and loved ones
- Exercise
- Seek out therapy services
- Between stressful activities, do something that you find fun
- Read and listen to music
- Limit news intake to once a day

virtual commemoration

Over the past 18 years, the Village has celebrated the life and legacy of Martin Luther King Jr. by having a community gathering. The video features past performances from the Sears Holdings Associate Gospel Choir, led by choir director Jeffrey Lomax; senior pastor Robbie Robinson and the Christian Tabernacle Church Choir of Roselle; and the Kingdom Impact Theater Ministries, which uses performing arts to entertain, equip, empower and educate people. The video also features "Strolling Down MLK Street," performed by Michael and Vikki Myers, which shows how Dr. King and his wife might respond to what they see if walking down MLK Street today.
