Village's recycling programs demonstrate commitment to sustainability

Celebrate Earth Day this April 22 – and every day – by using residential recycling programs! The Village of Hoffman Estates offers recycling options for paper and plastic, electronics, clothing, and more.

Due to the fluid nature of COVID-19, all information is subject to change. Follow the Village on social media and visit the website for the most up-to-date information.

All residential customers can take advantage of curbside recycling with Groot. The curbside program provides each residence with a 65-gallon toter for recycling paper, metal, plastic, glass and cartons. Items should be clean and dry, and materials do not need to be separated. For details on how to "recycle right" for curbside, check out page 6 of this issue.

Details on recycling for large electronics are included on page 2.

The Simple Recycling "orange bag" program provides residents with an easy way to dispose of unwanted textiles and small home goods. Residents can "simply" place items in Simple Recycling orange bags (or any bag labeled "Simple Recycling") next to their garbage and

recycling on their normal pickup day. Visit <u>www.simplerecycling.com</u> or call 866-835-5068 for details and to request additional bags.

A number of items are also accepted in the Village Hall lobby for donation or recycling. Residents can drop off used eyeglasses to benefit the Schaumburg-Hoffman Lions Club. Small electronics (cell phones, etc.) and printer cartridges are recycled through Recycling Avenue, a nonprofit serving adults with developmental disabilities. We also offer drop-off recycling for rechargeable and lithium ion batteries, as well as compact fluorescent (CFL) and fluorescent tube lights.

Historian's notebook

Electronics Recycling Drop-off Program resumes

April through November only; closed during severe weather

Electronic items are banned from Illinois landfills. To assist residents with collecting old electronics and to ensure environmentally safe recycling of these materials, the Village, in cooperation with the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC), is resuming its weekly drop-off collection program starting Monday, April 5. There is no charge to residents for this service, but all recycling must come from households.

Village Hall (follow the signs) 1900 Hassell Road Mondays: 10 a.m.-noon

Only a specific list of acceptable items will be allowed to be dropped off.
Visit www.swancc.org for a full list of acceptable items.



Residents from all SWANCC communities are eligible to participate and IDs will be checked. Do not drop off electronics outside of the posted dates and times. Electronics from businesses, churches or schools will not be accepted. Remove electronics from plastic packaging and boxes prior to dropping them off. Thank you for your cooperation!

As part of their plan to build not just homes but a community, F&S Construction broke ground on a movie theater on Nov. 11, 1965. They named it the Thunderbird. I don't know who chose the name, but it was a memorable one.

I received a photo and caption of the groundbreaking from Schaumburg Township District Library historian Jane Rozek. Pictured were F&S Construction's Jack Hoffman and Robert Haag, as well as Mayor Roy Jenkins and Duncan Kennedy, president of Kennedy Theaters, Inc. I noticed that you could see the National grocery store, located at the northwest corner of the Golf Rose Shopping Center, in the background of the photo. The Thunderbird was at the south end of the shopping center facing north.

It opened on Oct. 21, 1966, with seating for 1,200 moviegoers. I recall how large and beautiful the lobby was. It had only one 60-foot screen with six-track sound that was available back then. It wasn't until 1977, when the original theater was split in half, that it changed its name to Century. As time went on, the screens were split again, and the Century became a four-screen theater.

Two of my sons and a neighbor worked at the theater when they were in high school. It was the perfect job for young people. They talked about how small the projection booth was, but how the projectionist had a cozy chair for a long day's work. If the film snapped, he had to be available to fix it. He also had to change reels in order to smoothly continue the movie without any interruptions.

Those "kids," now getting to be older adults, told me stories about the barter system they had with Naugles, a Mexican restaurant on Roselle Road where the new McDonald's is today. They'd get a free meal and give the Naugles staff passes to see the late show. The managers of the Century and Woodfield theaters always offered free passes to one

another's staff. Popcorn was the other story from the "kids" – the smell of it was so enticing when you entered the lobby, that you just had to buy a large popcorn with extra butter (and maybe a small one for each of the kids). That was the item that brought in the most profit. A huge bag of popcorn seed was cheap to buy, but it was a big money maker for the movie theater.

We'd buy our candy at Snyder Drugs, which was right next door. It was a better buy. I loved my Chuckles and chocolate nonpareils. What were your favorites? Many are no longer available.

Sadly, the Century movie theater closed in November 1986. The building is still there – it was once a Harlem Furniture and now it's the Royal Buffet. Take a look at the east side of the building and you can see that it was once a movie theater.

Spring branch pickup begins April 19


Hoffman Estates' free curbside spring tree branch pickup program begins on Monday, April 19. This program is for residents covered by the Village refuse collection contract.

Only one collection pass will be made for each street. Please do not ask for exceptions.

If branches are too large, are mixed with unacceptable materials or have not been prepared properly, they will **not** be picked up.

Branch pickup schedule:

- **A.** <u>Beginning April 19</u>: All streets north of the Tollway (I-90). All streets west of Route 59.
- B. <u>Beginning April 26</u>: All streets within the boundaries north of Golf Road, south of the Tollway, east of Barrington Road and west of Roselle Road.
- C. <u>Beginning May 3</u>: All streets within the boundaries north of Schaumburg Road, south of Golf Road, east of Barrington Road and west of Roselle Road
- D. <u>Beginning May 10</u>: All streets within the boundaries north of Schaumburg Road, south of Golf Road, east of Roselle Road and west of Plum Grove Road.



On the first date of pickup listed for your area, neatly stack branches at curbside by 7 a.m. Face the cut ends toward the street. Do not tie branches in bundles or place in any container. Do not allow branches to protrude into the street or block sidewalks.

While supplies last, free woodchips will be available to residents at the Village's fleet maintenance facility, 2405 Pembroke Ave., during daylight hours **after 3 p.m.**, Monday through Friday, and during daylight hours on weekends. Please bring your own containers.

A message from Mayor McLeod

I was privileged to be a part of a special ceremony at AMITA Health St. Alexius Medical Center on March 1 to honor the lives of the individuals who have been lost to COVID-19, and to recognize the families and loved ones they left behind.

The private, socially distanced event, held in the hospital chapel, was attended by several dignitaries, including Mayor Rodney Craig from Hanover Park and Cook County Commissioner Kevin B. Morrison (15th District). I was fortunate and humbled to read a statement from U.S. Rep. Raja Krishnamoorthi during the ceremony. Several front-line hospital staff, including Chief Medical Officer Michael Handler and the foremost infectious disease expert for the hospital, Dr. Lynwood Jones, were also in attendance. Polly Davenport, president of St. Alexius, and her staff were instrumental in pulling this effort together.



The significance of this event is not lost on me, our elected officials or the Hoffman Estates community. In January 2020, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) officials announced that a patient with the second confirmed case of COVID-19 in the United States was being treated at AMITA Health St. Alexius Medical Center. Shortly after, the second Illinois case, the first human-to-human transmission identified in the nation, was also announced at our local hospital.

Thank you to Kristin Urquiza, community activist and founder of Marked by COVID, for her avid support of this effort and for bringing attention to the individuals affected by this tragic pandemic. The first Monday in March will always be known as COVID-19 Memorial Day in the Village of Hoffman Estates.

Coffee with the Board

No-fee garage sale permits required

Residents must obtain a free permit to hold a garage sale. The permit can be obtained by emailing garagesales@hoffmanestates.org or by visiting the Village Hall with the dates and address of the proposed sale. Garage sales are only allowed to take place on Thursdays, Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays, and a sale may not span more than four consecutive days. A maximum of three garage sales are allowed per address each calendar year and must take place within the hours of 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. If a garage sale is conducted without a permit, a \$10 "on site" permit fee will be assessed. Spring hydrant flushing begins soon

Annual hydrant flushing is scheduled to begin the week of March 29 between the hours of 8 a.m. and 2 p.m. This is a six-week program. Watch for signs advising of the exact days for your neighborhood. Hydrants are flushed to circulate fresh water. Tap water may be discol-

ored in your immediate area during flushing. Remove faucet screens and run water through a bathtub faucet for a few minutes to make sure it is clear before using. Also, be sure to check the water before washing clothes, as sediment may stain clothes. Most municipal water systems perform annual hydrant

flushing to ensure delivery of

the best water quality.

Newest apparatus in firefighting arsenal makes its debut

The Hoffman Estates Fire Department will soon place in service a 2020 Pierce Ascendant 100' Heavy-Duty Aerial Tower. The apparatus arrived in February and went through its final inspections by the department apparatus committee. Members received training throughout the first two weeks of March, and it will be put in service as Tower 22 in April. Tower 22 will respond as the first-line aerial apparatus on all structure fires, automatic fire alarms and extrications throughout the Village, as well as out-of-town mutual aid responses. Look for Tower 22, the pride of the fleet, proudly stationed at Fire Station 22, 1700 Moon Lake Blvd.



Building permits online

The Code Enforcement Division is committed to providing a healthy, safe and professional environment for all Hoffman Estates residents, businesses and employees. Spring can be the perfect time to get started on improvement projects, and many of these projects require a building permit. As a result of COVID-19, the Village has made the permitting process simpler by accepting permit applications online. This change allows for a hands-free drop-off and makes the submittal more efficient. The Village has also initiated several new procedures since the onset of the pandemic in order to keep visitors and staff healthy, such as social distancing measures at all points of interaction, and frequent cleaning and disinfecting of Village facilities. Yard waste collection resumes April 5

Residents are reminded that grass clippings, plant material and leaves must be placed in brown paper yard waste bags. Bags cannot exceed 45 pounds, and a yard waste disposal sticker must be affixed to each bag. An annual subscription for unlimited yard waste pickup is also available through Groot by calling 800-244-1977.

Healthy body, healthy mind ... news from Health and Human Services

The safety of the Hoffman Estates community is important to the Health and Human Services Department. The Village is monitoring the COVID-19 pandemic closely and will continue to update guidance based on current recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the World Health Organization (WHO). For additional updates, visit www.hoffmanestates.org/coronavirus. If you have questions about vaccines, services or resources, call 847-781-4850.

Adult services and immunizations

Health and Human Services offers health screenings and preventative tests.

- · Blood pressure and pulse check: free!
- Diabetes (blood sugar): \$2
- Hemoglobin (anemia): \$3

To schedule health screenings, preventative tests, or affordable vaccines and tuberculosis testing, call 847-781-4850.

Cholesterol screening

This <u>FASTING</u> test measures total cholesterol, HDL, LDL, triglycerides and glucose levels. It requires a small drop of blood. Results are immediate and include consultation with a nurse. To schedule an appointment, call 847-781-4850. The cost is \$22.

Hemoglobin A1C screening

The hemoglobin A1C test is a simple finger stick to find out if you have diabetes or are at risk of developing diabetes. The test takes six minutes and the cost is \$15. To schedule an appointment, call 847-781-4850.

Children's clinics

Health and Human Services currently hosts baby and children's vaccination clinics. These clinics have always used exceptional infection control policies, but they now institute additional guidelines, as suggested by the CDC, the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH), and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA). These added safety measures will help to ensure the health of patients, as well as protect Village employees.

Health and Human Services is offering **individual appointment times** for each child. The following precautions are also in place:

- Appointments will be staggered to promote social distancing
- A new COVID-19 questionnaire will be answered by each individual
- Temperature checks will be done prior to appointment time
- Face coverings/masks will be required for anyone over the age of 2
- Only one parent per child while inside the Village Hall is encouraged
- Additional hand sanitizing stations have been placed throughout the Village Hall
- All immunizations will be discussed with families by nurses via telephone before appointments
- Credit card payments (if necessary) will be done via telephone
- Staff will be required to wear additional personal protective equipment (PPE)

Emergency assistance programs

Health and Human Services is a volunteer service extension site for the Salvation Army program and, as such, provides Salvation Army emergency assistance to Hoffman Estates residents in need. This fund provides limited financial support to families who may be experiencing an unexpected emergency, such as insufficient funds for rent or past due utility bills. With the COVID-19 pandemic, assistance applications are offered for those who have been impacted by the virus and are experiencing a financial hardship. Staff will meet with each client for approximately 45 minutes to assess the need for additional services and to provide referrals. Health and Human Services loans medical equipment to Hoffman Estates residents, such as wheelchairs, walkers, canes, crutches and knee scooters. Solicitors are NOT allowed to approach a home that displays a "No Solicitors Invited" sticker. Stickers are available for free at the Village Hall. The Village allows solicitation from 10 a.m.-8 p.m. Monday through Friday and 10 a.m.-6 p.m. on Saturday. Nonprofits are the only groups that can solicit on Sunday from 10 a.m.-6 p.m. If you experience an unlicensed or overaggressive solicitor, dial 911.

Cardboard (flattened),

PLASTIC

Containers: Bottles, Tubs, Jugs, and Jars Only



CARTONS

May be acceptable in some programs, check with local authority.



Containers: Bottles & Jars Only



No Plastic Bags No Plastic Wrap (return clean to retailer)



No Tanglers (Hangers, Hoses, Wire, Cords, Ropes or Chains)



No Big Items (Electronics, Wood, Propane Tanks, Scrap Metal or Styrofoam – check local authority for other options)



No Clothing
Textiles or Shoes (donate)



No Food, Liquid, Diapers, Batteries or Needles



Put material in loose - Not in Bags



No Shredded Paper (check with local authority for other recycling options)



National Autism Awareness Month

April is recognized as National Autism Awareness Month, which celebrates, creates awareness and advocates for those who have been diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder (ASD). ASD is characterized by challenges with social skills, speech and nonverbal communication, as well as repetitive behaviors

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), approximately 1 in 54 children in the United States are diagnosed with ASD. Moreover, boys are four times more likely to be diagnosed with autism than girls.



Autism is a lifelong condition, and it can present challenges in adulthood in the home, at work, and with establishing and maintaining relationships. Extensive research has been conducted to explore the cause of autism, with no single source being identified as leading to its development. Rather, risk factors have been identified as increasing the likelihood of autism, including children born to older parents, pregnancy and birth complications, and genetic changes. Those with ASD have been shown to do the best with early intervention and applied behavior analysis (ABA), an evidence-based therapy. A function of ABA is teaching social skills that govern social interactions, which can be done through a social skills group.

In celebration of National Autism Awareness Month, Health and Human Services is proud to present an interactive virtual workshop for adults (18+) with ASD, emphasizing the exploration of social and emotional skills. Join us on Friday, April 16, from 7-8:30 p.m. via Zoom. RSVP no later than April 13, and a Zoom link will be sent to you.
