Annual recycling event returns August 28

Hoffman Estates is hosting its free, annual recycling drop-off and document destruction event on Saturday, August 28, from 9 a.m. to noon.



Due to high participation, residents are advised to arrive early at the Susan H. Kenley-Rupnow Public Works Center, 2305 Pembroke Ave. Please note that the event will conclude promptly at noon.

Simply drive to the Public Works Center, and workers will unload the recyclables from your car! Residents must remain in their vehicle at all times. Residents will unlock doors or open the trunk from inside the vehicle, and staff will unload the items. Paper documents should be contained in one area in the back of a vehicle in paper bags or small boxes – not in plastic bags! If a resident has both electronics and paper, keep

these materials separate in the back of the vehicle – don't mix electronics with paper!

If anyone in your home has recently tested positive for COVID-19 or is experiencing symptoms, DO NOT attend this event. Most items can be recycled separately through the Village's ongoing programs.

Growing to Greenness!

Historian's notebook

Care for the environment while caring for your asphalt

If you have an asphalt driveway, you know the routine...every few years, the asphalt needs recoating. Sealcoating covers cracks in the asphalt and ensures that your blacktop driveway will last. But did you know that sealcoating can have negative effects on both the environment and your health?

Two primary types of sealant are used for residential sealcoating: asphalt-based sealants, and sealants made with coal tar or coal-tar pitch. Coal tar-based sealants have extremely high concentrations of polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbon, or PAH. Coal tar and pitch are classified as known human carcinogens and have been shown to negatively impact water quality and the health of aquatic animals and plants.



According to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) and other federal sources, coal tar sealants don't just stick to your driveway. Sealants run off into our rivers and streams when it rains, and they are brought into our homes on our shoes and as dust in the air.

A number of states and municipalities have banned the use of coal tar-based sealants. While Hoffman Estates does not specifically ban coal tar, the Village uses alternate products for municipal road projects.

Most sealcoating companies now offer alternatives to coal tar-based sealants. So when it comes time to sealcoat, make sure you know what you're buying!

Hoffman Estates is home to a beautiful golf course: Hilldale Golf Club at 1625 Ardwick Drive. In fact, our Village Hall sits right in the middle of it! Holes 12, 14 and 15 are laid out to the west, north and east side of Village Hall, and the 18-hole course straddles Hassell Road and the beautiful. winding Huntington Boulevard. Being in the middle of the golf course, you'd expect the golf balls to hit a window or two...but luckily, those encounters are rare!

The course opened in 1971 and is celebrating its 50th birthday this year. Robert Trent Jones, Sr., ASGCA, designed and laid out the course over what had been the Marshall Field

Hunting Club and Skeet Shooting Range. Fortunately, many of the majestic, more than 100-year-old oak trees that stood on the property were saved. The trees actually date back to the original Wild Cat Grove, the first settlement for the pioneer families who migrated to this area in the 1840s.

Hilldale is a Par 71 course and is open year-round, weather permitting. It is a public course known to have "the best greens in the 'burbs," according to the Chicagoland Golf Guide. Hilldale is rated as one of the top 50 courses in Chicagoland with bent grass greens and bent grass fairways.

When golfers finish their round of play, there's C.K. Mulligan's Bar and Grill, where they can quench their thirst and settle down to a nice plate of food.

I spoke with General Manager Jim Rogers, who has been at Hilldale Golf Club for the last 18 years. Neither he nor I could pinpoint the exact day or month the golf course opened in 1971, but a half a century is a good long run for any business. Hopefully the course has many more years of driving and putting ahead of it.

Help keep stormwater clean

Please do your part to reduce pollution and keep our waterways clean. See the information below about storm sewers, stormwater and waterways.

- 1. Storm sewers are designed to collect only stormwater runoff.
- 2. Water entering the storm sewer system is not treated before moving into downstream waterways such as ponds, creeks, wetlands and other areas.
- 3. Sump pumps that collect surface water, or ground water from the house perimeter, discharge into the storm sewer through surface runoff or direct pipe connection.
- 4. Interior house drains, including floor drains and ejector pump discharges, do not enter the storm sewer system. These sources enter a separate sanitary sewer system that flows to a water treatment plant before releasing the water into downstream waterways.
- 5. Dumping of any pollutants or waste into a storm sewer is **not permitted** and can pollute downstream waterways.
- All open grated drains that can collect surface water are part of the storm sewer system.
- 7. Runoff may contain pollutants, such as automotive fluids, fertilizers and pesticides, leaves, sediment, litter, and pet waste.
- 8. Runoff may become polluted as it runs along roads, parking lots, roofs, lawns and construction sites

Sponsored by the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC), residents of Hoffman Estates and other SWANCC-member communities are invited to drop off electronics, documents, textiles, medication, sharps, light bulbs, paint and more for recycling at this free, one-day event. Proof of residency is required. Materials will not be accepted from businesses, schools or non-SWANCC residents. If you cannot come to the Hoffman Estates recycling day, you may attend any SWANCC recycling event (proof of residency required). Visit www.swancc.org for more collection dates.

About paper

Only sensitive documents will be accepted, including medical records, bank statements and retired tax forms. Do not include magazines, greeting cards

or newspapers, as these can be recycled curbside.
Paper is cross-shredded on site. Residents are limited to six file-size boxes or grocery-size paper bags of documents. Plastic, metal clips and binders must be removed. **Do not bring paper in plastic bags**. Plastic is a contaminant, as are photos, slides and any nonpaper item. Boxes will be returned to the resident.



About electronics

Remove electronics from plastic packaging and boxes before the event. Accepted electronic items include:

- Cable receivers
- Cell phones, PDAs and tablets
- Computers (desktop and laptop) and computer equipment/components (e.g., cables, keyboards, mice, monitors, etc.)
- Converter boxes
- · Desktop fax machines, printers and scanners
- MP3 players
- TVs
- Videogame consoles
- Video recorders/players
- Zip drives

Items **NOT** accepted include air conditioners; CDs, DVDs or VHS tapes; humidifiers/dehumidifiers; lamps; microwaves; refrigerators and other large home appliances; speakers; stereos; and vacuum cleaners.

Additional services

In addition to electronics, the Village will be accepting these items for recycling:

- Textiles and small household goods through Simple Recycling (new or used clothing; boots and shoes; belts and ties; handbags; hats and gloves; toys; towels; sheets and blankets; small kitchen appliances; and more)
- Expired drugs/sharps
- Fluorescent and compact fluorescent lamp (CFL) light bulbs
- Batteries
- · Printer cartridges
- Latex (water-based) paint:
 - Spray cans: \$2
 - Quarts: \$2.50
 - One-gallon containers: \$5
 - Five-gallon buckets: \$18
- · Oil-based paint:
 - Quarts: \$5
 - One-gallon containers: \$9
 - Pails: \$20

NOTE: flammable materials will not be accepted.

Deck, Patio and Fence Permits

Summer is a great time to make updates to your home. If you are planning to build a deck, shed, patio or fence - don't forget to obtain the required Village building permit! The Village issues permits and requires inspections to ensure that these structures are safe and installed properly. Properly installed decks, sheds, patios and fences last longer and add to property values. If improperly installed, they can fail, resulting in costly repairs, damage to other structures and injuries. Village staff will review your permit application and verify that your project will meet Village Code requirements. Please be prepared and bring a copy of your Plat of Survey when applying for a building permit. A Plat of Survey is typically included with your home's closing papers.

Adult services and immunizations

Health and Human Services offers health screenings and preventative tests.

- Blood pressure and pulse check: free!
- Diabetes (blood sugar): \$2
- Hemoglobin (anemia): \$3

To schedule health screenings, preventative tests, or affordable vaccines and tuberculosis testing, call 847-781-4850.



Cholesterol Screening

This <u>FASTING</u> test measures total cholesterol, HDL, LDL, triglycerides and glucose levels. It requires a small drop of blood. Results are immediate and include consultation with a nurse. To schedule an appointment, call 847-781-4850. The cost is \$22.

Hemoglobin A1C screening

The hemoglobin A1C test is a simple finger stick to find out if you have diabetes or are at risk of developing diabetes. The test takes six minutes and the cost is \$15. To schedule an appointment, call 847-781-4850.



Children and Baby Clinic

Health and Human Services offers children's and baby's vaccination clinics, which use outstanding infection control policies that follow safety guidelines from the Centers for Disease Control, the Illinois Department of Public Health and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration. These measures help to ensure the health of patients and protect employees.

Individual appointment times are offered for each child, with the following precautions:

- Appointments are staggered to promote social distancing.
- A COVID-19 questionnaire must be answered by each individual.
- Temperature checks are done prior to appointment time.
- Face coverings/masks are required for anyone over the age of 2.
- Only one parent per child while inside the office is encouraged.
- Additional hand-sanitizing stations are available throughout the office for client use.

- All immunizations will be discussed with families by nurses during a phone call before appointments.
- Credit card payments (if necessary) will be completed over the phone.
- Staff members are required to wear additional PPE.

Infection control protocols are also in place to ensure your safety while receiving vaccines.

Back-to-school anxiety

Transitioning from summer break and going back to school can bring up feelings of worry and anxiety for kids and their parents or guardians. Children may talk about their worries, become tearful, demonstrate school refusal, or become clingier during the transition period back to school.

Many children were home more than usual over the last year because of remote learning, coupled with fewer social activities due to the pandemic. The transition back to in-person school (for those who are attending in-person) can bring feelings of loss, sadness, worry, excitement, relief, happiness and more.

It may be helpful to arrange for your child to see the school again before the start of the academic year and to meet their teachers. Practice and exposure can help reduce the worry and increase a sense of mastery and competence. Another way parents can support their children is to ask them how they feel about returning to school, but not try to fix it... parents can listen and offer support.

Parents can listen to their child and respond with one of the following:

- "It is okay to feel the way that you do. We will get through this."
- "The anxiety or worry will pass and I am here for you."
- "Tell me all your worries so you can express them and you then don't have to go over them alone in your mind."

Parents/guardians can take other steps to support their child going back to school:

- Help the child observe what they are feeling anxious about, and invite them to discuss it openly.
- Help the child think of a relaxing or safe place where they feel calm or happy, that they can imagine when feeling worried.
- After talking about the worry, you can help your child by having them think of something positive related to school. For example, you can ask which parts of school they are looking forward to.
- The child may need a hug, as human contact when wanted can be very calming.
- Talk about your belief in the child's ability to manage and survive their feelings
 of worry.
- Tell the child all the strengths you see in them and tell them how that will help them transition into school.
- Remind them that they can talk to you about their worries.
