### **Electricity** bill credit

### **Historian's** notebook

Residents and businesses can expect to see a carbon mitigation credit that will reduce utility expenses through May 2023. The credit will appear on ComEd bills (or the ComEd portion of your supplier bill) as "Carbon-Free Energy Resource Adjustment."

The reduction of 4.3¢/kWh for the four summer months and a 3.6¢/kWh credit on electricity bills for the eight non-summer months relates to the profitability of nuclear plants owned by ComEd's parent company (Exelon). The Carbon-Free Resource Adjustment will be re-evaluated annually. If the market drops back to more historical levels, the charges may revert to ComEd customers.

I knew eventually that the beautiful building was to be torn down, but when I saw the slow, deliberate demolition begin, there was sadness in my heart. Each time I drove by the old Lincoln Federal Savings and Loan building, presently BMO Harris Bank, I'd slow down to see what progress had been made.

It began on the inside. Through the tall windows, you could see the teardown begin. As with all demolition work, I'm sure what could be salvaged was salvaged for reuse somewhere else.

Then one day, as I drove down Higgins Road and headed to the post office, the large piece of machinery with a wrecking ball was on the south side of the building, beginning its tedious work of taking down this graceful and stylish building.

Through my research at the Schaumburg Township District Library, I learned about the details of its beginning at 1400 N. Gannon Drive in Hoffman Estates.

Lincoln Federal Saving and Loan of Berwyn made the announcement in 1973 that they would be opening a new branch in Hoffman Estates. Its postmodern style was designed by Godfrey L. Duke, an architect from Wheeling. The original plans were for two buildings, but they were modified, and it finally opened in June 1975.

The graceful colonnades supporting the roof overhang were pre-cast concrete of white quartz aggregate. It had two round fountains near the entrance and eight drive-in lanes. The interior of the bank housed an automatic 24-hour self-service post office, a welcome addition for the

Hoffman Estates residents. The vending machines offered stamped envelopes, stamps, postcards and weighing scales for packages. A convenient coin change machine was also available.

This has been a sad tear down of a lovely building. Our village changes each time we lose some of our early buildings. I remember our Village Hall on Gannon and Golf and the bowling alley on Higgins and Roselle. The teardown of the south end of Hoffman Plaza was very dramatic as it was not a complete tear down but a redesign of the 1959 building. Hoffman Plaza now has the beautiful Burlington Store and Lofts.

Hopefully, we'll have new and exciting buildings replace those that fell to the wrecking ball.

With fall and winter approaching, many people are wondering how to stay healthy from contagious illnesses such as the flu, colds and other viruses, including COVID-19. # HEPD introduces new social worker

The Hoffman Estates Police Department is pleased to welcome Nataly Correa to the team as the Village's first full-time social worker. The new position was made possible through a \$150,000 Byrne Justice Assistance Grant awarded to the Village and procured with the support of Congressman Raja Krishnamoorthi and the WINGS Program, a local non-profit committed to breaking the cycle of domestic violence.

Police departments across the nation have seen an increase in calls for service relating to mental health and domestic violence. When responding to these calls, Hoffman Estates police officers recognized the need for additional resources, such as crisis intervention and long-term counseling. Adding Nataly to the Village's workforce allows the Police Department to respond to the increased demand and provide real-time services to victims of domestic violence.

Nataly brings a well-rounded background in social work to the Hoffman Estates community. She is bilingual and has a master's degree specializing in substance abuse, forensic psychology and criminal justice. As a licensed social worker, she is experienced in both police social work and children's advocacy. Nataly is passionate about assisting the community and places



a strong emphasis on helping victims of domestic violence.

Some of the services Nataly provides include crises intervention and court advocacy. If requested, she will walk a victim of domestic violence through the entire court process and provide them with long-term services. Nataly also assists with community outreach efforts and is able to provide professional referrals for chemical or substance abuse and mental health treatment. She also focuses on elderly and youth services, counseling and violent crime victim assistance.

Finally, Nataly also shares her time with the Village's Health and Human Services Department and the WINGS Program. Her work will be vital in streamlining and providing immediate assistance to those in need. To reach Nataly for services, contact the Police Department at 847-781-7800.

Health and Human Services offers health screenings, vaccines and preventative tests for both adults and children. Call 847-781-4850 to schedule!

### **Adult services and immunizations**

- · Blood pressure and pulse check: free!
- Diabetes (blood sugar): \$2
- Hemoglobin (anemia): \$3

### **Cholesterol Screening**

This FASTING test measures total cholesterol, HDL, LDL, triglycerides and glucose levels. It requires a small drop of blood. Results are immediate and include a consultation with a nurse. The cost is \$22.

### **Hemoglobin A1C screening**

The hemoglobin A1C test is a simple finger stick to find out if you have diabetes or are at risk of developing diabetes. The test takes six minutes and the cost is \$15.

### **Children and Baby Clinics**

The clinic has always used outstanding infection control policies and has instituted additional guidelines according to the Centers for Disease Control, Illinois Department of Public Health and Occupational Safety and Health Administration. Added safety measures help to ensure the health of patients, as well as to protect employees.



Individual appointment times for each child include the following precautions:

- Appointments will be staggered to promote social distancing.
- A COVID-19 questionnaire will be answered by each individual.
- Temperature checks are performed prior to appointment time.
- Face coverings/masks are required for anyone over the age of two.
- Only one parent per child while inside the office is encouraged.
- Additional hand sanitizing stations are available throughout the office for client use.
- All immunizations are discussed with families by nurses during phone calls before appointments.
- Credit card payments (if necessary) will be completed over the phone.
- Staff members are required to wear PPE.

Health and Human Services provides these important services to the community and asks that you do not hesitate to call with any questions at 847-781-4850. ### September is National Prostate Cancer Awareness Month!

The American Cancer Society (ACS) estimates that approximately 268,490 men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer this year resulting in 34,500 deaths. Early diagnosis is key to increasing survival rates, and the ACS recommends that screenings begin at age 50. Those at a higher risk, including African Americans and men with strong family histories of prostate cancer, should begin screening at age 40.

Not all men experience symptoms of prostate cancer. Doctors often find early signs during routine check-ups. Be sure to check with your doctor if you experience any changes in urinary or sexual function since many prostate cancer symptoms can also indicate the presence of other diseases.

It is important for men to learn the facts and understand their risks for prostate cancer. During September, all men are encouraged to talk about prostate cancer with their health care providers. ### September dates for seasonal brush drop-off



### **Protect our urban canopy by watering trees**

Trees provide many benefits, and we need your help to care for the Village's urban canopy. As summer winds down, hot days and a lack of precipitation in early fall can still cause trees to suffer from stress and decline. Please water slowly in the early morning or late afternoon/evening to provide the most benefit (and to comply with the Village's watering ban, which is in effect from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily from May through September). Residents are encouraged to contact Public Works at 847-490-6800 with any tree questions; the Village has arborists on staff to assist you.

### **Purchase pet tags by November 1**

If a pet becomes lost, the Village can reunite them with their family through a registered pet tag. The Village requires an annual pet license for each indoor and outdoor dog and cat. Tags purchased for 2021 expire October 31, and 2022 tags should be purchased prior to November 1. Please note that late fees will be assessed after November 30. Licenses can be purchased at Village Hall for \$5 each and \$2 for senior citizens (not to exceed two animals per household). A maximum of five dogs or five cats (or a combination of the two) are permitted in each residence. A current rabies tag number and the expiration date is needed to register. # **Sister Cities presents**"Meet Mary Cassatt: An American Artist"

The Hoffman Estates Sister Cities Commission is pleased to present "Meet Mary Cassatt: An American Artist," a historical reenactment by Schaumburg resident and children's author Lynn Rymarz. The event will take place at 11 a.m. on Saturday, November 12, at Village Hall, 1900 Hassell Road.

Discover Mary Cassatt, an American painter and printmaker who lived from 1844 to 1926. Although her father objected to her career choice, she began studying painting at the age of 15 before moving to Paris to study the master artists of her day.

Mary Cassatt has been described as one of "Les Trois Grandes Dames" (The Three Great Ladies) of impressionism.

### **Monarch waystations**

Let's talk monarch butterfly waystations! Milkweed and other nectar resources are in huge decline due to habitat loss, herbicide use, frequent mowing and climate change. Waystations are spaces where monarch butterfly habitats are planted to provide the resources butterflies need to survive.

Monarch butterflies were recently listed as an endangered species by the International Union for Conservation of Nature.

Waystations have become crucial to helping monarchs produce successive generations and sustain their migration. Milkweed and pollinating plants grown in waystations support egg laying, caterpillar growth and provide the energy sources needed for monarch livelihood and their migration flights.

One way you can support monarch butterflies and other pollinator populations is to do seed collections in the fall. This is a free and easy way to gather, propagate and expand your current native landscaping. Consider registering your native plant garden as a monarch waystation each year through the Monarch Watch website at monarchwatch.org to support this species and the Mayor's Monarch Pledge.

Hoffman Estates' free curbside branch pickup fall program will begin the week of Monday, September 19. This program is for residents covered by the Village refuse collection contract. Zones and dates have been established for various sections of the community.

Only one collection pass will be made for each street. Do not ask for exceptions. Do not park in front of branches placed for collection.

If branches are too large, are mixed with unacceptable materials or have not been prepared properly, they will not be picked up.

Public Works crews WILL accept:

- Tree branches no larger than 8 inches in diameter or 10 feet in length
- Shrub trimmings and similar brush
- Branches from willow trees if separated from other materials

Public Works crews WILL NOT accept:

- · Tree trunks, stumps or root balls
- Firewood
- · Railroad ties or landscape timbers
- Grass clippings, leaves, sod, plants or yard waste


On the first date of pickup listed for your zone, neatly stack branches at the curbside no later than 7 a.m. Once branches from your zone are picked up, the branch pickup concludes for this zone until the spring pickup.

### DO NOT:

- Tie branches in bundles or place in any container
- Allow branches to protrude into the street or block sidewalks
- Stack branches around street signs, street lights, mailboxes or directly in front of parkway trees

### Floodplain information and services

Flooding can happen to anyone. Even if you do not live near a body of water or have ever previously experienced flooding, a flooding risk may still exist. Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM) identify areas at higher risk of flooding, known as the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) (or commonly "floodplain"). FIRMs are prepared by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to identify flood zones and determine risk. The Village can assist homeowners, renters and business owners in determining if your home or business is located within a SFHA.

The Village offers a service that is free to anyone interested in obtaining information regarding the Village's FIRMs. Available information includes:

- Whether a property is in a Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) and if there may be a requirement to purchase flood insurance.
- FIRM flood zone, panel number, suffix, panel date and regulatory base flood elevation for a property.
- A map of the property with the flood zone overlaid.
- Additional flood map information, including floodways and regulatory requirements for development in a floodway.
- Local drainage issues or flooding sources not identified on the FIRM.

 Information regarding wetland and open space areas within the Village and regulations prohibiting development.

The goal of the map information service is to educate the community about the potential flood risk on a designated property; to improve floodplain management; and to provide information about steps that can be taken to reduce losses as a result of potential flooding events.

As a participating community in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) Community Rating System (CRS), property owners within the Village are eligible for flood insurance policies at discounted rates. Only a specific flood insurance policy will cover damage related to flooding. Policy details and rate information can be obtained through most insurance agents.
