Linking neighboring municipal water systems through interconnections provides an additional water supply backup that can help each community better manage water demand in the event of power outages, equipment failures, water quality issues, or other unforeseen disruptions. This \$1.3 million project is the Village's first water interconnection.

The Village of Hoffman Estates offers a high-quality and reliable primary water supply to residents and businesses sourced from Lake Michigan and delivered to the Village's water distribution system by the North Suburban Municipal Joint Action Water Agency. While the Village has a number

of backup wells that can provide potable water in an emergency, these municipal wells were drilled in the 1960s and 1970s and provide lesser quality water.

Like Hoffman Estates, the Village of Palatine also uses Lake Michigan water as its primary source. The water interconnection between the communities allows for the transfer of Lake Michigan water from one system to the other in response to an emergency, providing both municipalities the ability to distribute the customarily high-quality supply of water even during times of disruption.

# **Historian's** notebook

The recent announcement on March 14, 2023, by the Cook County Forest Preserve on the establishment of Poplar Creek Preserve as a land and water reserve took me back to the failure of the proposed Leisure World development in 1965, which would have seen residential development in that area of the Village if not for the financial failure of Leisure World's corporate owner, Roosmoor Corporation.

Roosmoor was successful in building their Leisure World retirement communities across the country, in California and on the east coast. The communities are doing well and still draw people over 55 to their gated communities.

Failure isn't always a failure for all the parties involved in a project. After Hoffman Estates annexed the 3,700 acres needed to build Leisure World, the failure of the planned retirement community with a projected population of 50,000 opened the door for the Cook County Forest Preserve to purchase the land that would become the Arthur L. Janura Cook County Forest Preserve.

At the time, it was hoped that the Forest Preserve would compromise a bit by allowing the Village to keep some of the land for commercial development. No compromise was reached, but it was still a very positive outcome for the people of Hoffman Estates.

The large Arthur L. Janura Preserve now contains the Poplar Creek Preserve, as well

as miles of biking and walking trails. The newly named Poplar Creek Land and Water Reserve is bounded by the Canadian National Railway on the west, Shoe Factory Road on the north, Sutton Road (Rt. 59) on the east and Golf Road on the south, and contains 572.14 acres. The Poplar Creek Land and Water Reserve also contains an extension of a rare gravel prairie, one of only a few gravel prairies still left in the northeastern part of the state.

This area is adjacent to the Shoe Factory Road Nature Preserve, which is already being restored by volunteers who are removing invasive species, collect seeds and plant native plants. The land is home to at least 27 plant and wildlife species that are in the greatest need of conservation. The entire Arthur L. Janura Preserve is a treasure trove of wild birds, animals, prairies and forests, giving our Village residents the peace and recreation needed for our busy lives.

The failure of a commercial and residential development back in 1965 has given us a wonderful opportunity to continue to protect the environment of our land and animals, and has resulted in a wonderful asset for Hoffman Estates that will last for years to come.

# Village named Tree City USA for 32nd consecutive year

For the 32nd year, the National Arbor Day Foundation has named the Village of Hoffman Estates a Tree City USA. The National Arbor Day Foundation, in cooperation with the National Association of State Foresters and the U.S. Department of Agriculture Forest Service, sponsors the Tree City USA program. To be designated a Tree City USA, Hoffman Estates must annually meet the following standards:

- Have an established tree board or department
- Have a tree care ordinance
- Have a community forestry program with an annual budget of at least \$2 per capita
- Have an Arbor Day observation and proclamation

A municipality's designation as a Tree City community strongly contributes to a community's pride and value in their private and public property. Hoffman Estates continues to provide a level of stewardship necessary to build not only a great community today, but to plan for the future.

The Tree City USA program is a nationwide movement that provides the necessary framework for communities to manage and expand their urban forestry. This program has been greening up cities across America since 1976.



### May is **Building Safety** Month

The International Code Council (ICC) sponsors Building Safety Month every May to raise awareness about building safety. This campaign highlights how important it is for municipalities to adopt modern building codes and helps educate the public on what it takes to create safe and sustainable structures. A different area of building codes is showcased each week during Building Safety Month, stressing their



importance to the safety and security of buildings for safer and better living.

The Village of Hoffman Estates utilizes building codes to protect residents from disasters like fires, weather-related events and structural collapse. Building codes offer the best way to protect homes, offices, schools, manufacturing facilities, stores and entertainment venues through the issuance of building permits and regular inspections.

This year, the Village will adopt the 2021 International Codes, which are the most recent codes issued by the ICC. Adopting these codes reinforces our commitment to having buildings constructed and maintained within the Village held to the highest standards. ## Building permit portal: create an account



The Village's new eTRAKiT permit portal requires residents and contractors to create an account online to apply for permits and schedule inspections. Residents planning to hire a contractor for an upcoming construction project should ensure that the company is aware of this requirement.

The Village encourages residents and contractors to create their online account now in order to expedite the process when they are ready to submit an application for a permit.

Building & Code Enforcement staff are here to help guide residents and contractors through the registration and submittal process. All contractors must contact the Village in order to activate their account for the first time. ### Rental assistance available

A rental assistance program is still available for Hoffman Estates residents affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Grants up to \$12,000 are available for moderate and low-income Hoffman Estates residents who experienced a pandemic-related hardship and are behind on rent. Residents may be eligible if they meet the following criteria:

- Household income is at or below 80% of the area median income
- A rental unit is the primary residence in the Village of Hoffman
   Estates
- Can provide proof of financial hardship due to COVID-19
- Are currently behind on rent

The program is sponsored by the Village of Hoffman Estates using federal HUD/CARES Act CDBG-CV funds and is administered by the North West Housing Partnership (NWHP), a non-profit agency. #### **Cholesterol screening**

This FASTING test measures total cholesterol, HDL, LDL, triglycerides and glucose levels. It requires a small drop of blood. Results are immediate, and include consultation with a nurse. To schedule an appointment, call 847-781-4850. The cost is \$22.

#### **Hemoglobin A1C screening**

The Hemoglobin A1C test is a simple finger stick to find out if you are at risk or have diabetes by measuring your average blood sugar levels over the past three months. The test takes 6 minutes and the cost is only \$15. To schedule an appointment, call 847-781-4850.

#### **Children and baby clinics**

#### May is Better Hearing and **Speech Month**

Approximately 46 million people in the U.S. have a hearing or speech disorder. Hearing loss can be present at birth, develop suddenly, or happen over time. It can make it difficult for a person to hear the phone, hear warning alerts, understand others, and often leads to feelings of isolation. For children, hearing loss can affect the ability to develop communication, language, and social

The loss of hearing can be caused by some health conditions, medications, or earwax, but the most common cause is exposure to noise where sounds are either too loud or last too long.

Here are some ways to protect your hearing:

- Avoid noisy places and activities when
- Wear earplugs, noise-canceling earphones or headphones when sounds are loud.
- Turn down the volume when watching TV, listening to music, and using earbuds or headphones.
- Take breaks from the noise.

If you have hearing loss, pain, discomfort, or ringing in your ears, be sure to see your doctor. This month is a time for everyone to focus on their hearing and make sure to get it checked.

# LGBTQ+ Community Group Series

According to the CDC, youth identifying as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, or with another marginalized sexual orientation (LGBTQ+) are four times more likely to attempt suicide compared to heterosexual peers. The Trevor Project, an organization committed to ending LGBTQ+ youth suicide, emphasizes that queer and transgender young people are at higher risk for suicide due to systematic mistreatment and stigmatization in society.



Research supports that anti-queer discrimination can increase dramatically when political messaging targets LGBTQ+ youth. Access to spaces and healthcare affirming of queer and transgender identities is associated with lower rates of LGBTQ+ youth suicide attempts.

To provide an affirming space for LGBTQ+ mental health care, HHS is offering a free community group therapy series on LGBTQ+ Identity/Resilience during Pride month. The series includes 4 sessions for youth ages 14-17 who identify as LGBTQ+, and 1 session for parents/ caretakers of LGBTQ+ youth.

Please note parents can attend even if they do not have a child in the youth sessions, and vice versa. LGBTQ+ youth are encouraged to attend as many youth sessions as possible, but attendance at all youth sessions is not required. # **Drainage advice** from the **Engineering Division**

Spring weather typically brings high levels of precipitation, which can contribute to localized drainage issues. The Engineering Division is available to assist residents with technical advice on solving nuisance drainage concerns.

Stormwater management systems are designed to convey stormwater to nearby waterways through storm sewers and surface swales. While it is common for high-intensity rainfall events to overburden storm sewers and cause temporary ponding in low areas, overland surface drainage paths are designed to ensure structures are protected from surface flooding.

To ensure that your house is protected, the Village recommends completing the following steps:

- Regularly check that the ground settlement adjacent to the home's foundation slopes away from structures toward the nearest side, front, or rear yard swale.
- Extend downspouts and sump pump discharges several feet from structures and direct them to the nearest drainage swale, but not closer than three feet to your property line.
- Do not block or obstruct drainage paths from upstream areas. Typically, drainage paths are located along property lines. Over time, these drainage paths may become blocked by gardens, sheds, or raised landscape features.

Drainage improvements normally involve grading and/or the installation of private storm sewer systems. Since this work usually requires a Village permit, Village staff can offer advice for residents to consider on how to proceed.

If you would like to take advantage of the free drainage investigation service, utilize one of the methods below:

- Click the "I Want To..." button on the homepage of the Village website, then click "Make a Request" and select "Drainage Issues."
- Contact the Engineering Division by phone at 847-252-5800 or by email at RoadConstruction@hoffmanestates.org.

Please note that demand for this service is generally high, so allow for several weeks to schedule the drainage investigation.

### **Medical transportation** option -Township Riders Initiative Program (TRIP)

A medical transportation option is available for residents age 60 and over and those age 18 and over with a permanent disability. The Township Riders Initiative Program (TRIP) runs in partnership with Pace, offering qualifying riders low-cost transportation options for medical purposes in most of northwest Cook County.

The cost for TRIP service is between \$5 and \$10 each way, based on distance. Eligible appointments must be located within the following Townships: Barrington, Palatine, Wheeling, Hanover, Schaumburg, Elk Grove, or Maine. Trips to Cook County Hospital or the VA Hospitals in Maywood or Elgin are also eligible.

## **ComEd** performing line clearance **tree trimming**

ComEd is scheduled to begin work to trim trees and branches that interfere with power lines in Hoffman Estates this May. Over the next few months, ComEd crews will perform this preventative tree maintenance that reduces the chance of power outages and other safety hazards.

Areas slated for tree trimming in Hoffman Estates include Higgins Road between Barrington Road and Gannon Road (including residential areas near Glen Lake Road); residential areas just west of Roselle Road north of Golf Road; and areas west of Roselle Road south of Higgins Road. The trimming that ComEd is performing is done by trained, qualified arborists, and includes trees in front and back yards throughout the Village. ComEd is notifying residents using mailers and door tags in advance of tree trimming projects.

The final shape of each tree after trimming will depend on its size, shape, and proximity to the power lines. For more information about line clearance work being performed by ComEd, please visit their website or call 1-800-Edison1 (1-800-334-7661).



## Fire Department offering **CPR course** June 3

The Hoffman Estates Fire Department is offering a Heartsaver CPR/AED course on Saturday, June 3 from 9 a.m. to noon at Hoffman Estates Fire Station #24, 5775 Beacon Pointe Dr.

The course is intended for those with little to no medical training who want to learn CPR and AED use. Participants will learn when to phone 9-1-1, how to administer CPR, how to use an automated external defibrillator (AED), and how to provide relief from choking. The cost of the course is \$50 per person.

## 2023 **Sanitary Sewer** Rehabilitation Program

The Village's 2023 Sanitary Sewer Rehabilitation Program is scheduled to begin this spring and continue throughout the year. This program is an important initiative that improves the integrity of the sewer system by lining, repairing or replacing aging or damaged sewer lines and manhole structures. This work not only improves the flow of wastewater, it also lowers the risk of sewer backups and overflows by reducing storm water inflow and infiltration into the sanitary sewer system.

Cured-in-place pipe lining is scheduled to be the primary method of sewer rehabilitation this year. This involves inserting a flexible tube inside of the existing pipe, where it is inflated and cured, resulting in a "pipe within a pipe" as it hardens. This allows repairs to be made with minimal disruption to surrounding areas. However, when necessary, select repairs or replacements may be made using traditional excavation techniques. Residents and businesses in affected areas will be notified in advance of any construction activity.

# **Storm vs. sanitary sewer:** Where does the water go?

The sanitary sewer is a system of underground pipes that carry wastewater from bathrooms, sinks, kitchens and other plumbing components to a wastewater treatment plant, where it is filtered and treated before being discharged into a waterway.

The storm sewer is a system designed to carry rainfall runoff and other clean water sources only. Runoff is carried in underground pipes or open ditches and then discharged - untreated - into local streams, rivers and other surface water bodies. Storm sewer inlets are typically found along curbs and other low-lying outdoor areas.



Disposal of chemicals or hazardous substances to the storm sewer system damages the environment. Motor oil, cleaners, paints and other common household items that get into storm drains pollute groundwater sources and can poison fish, birds and other wildlife. In addition, grass clippings, leaves, litter and organic matter can clog storm drains and contribute to flooding.

Here are some things you can do to help maintain the storm sewer system and keep our environment clean:

- Do not pour ANYTHING into storm sewer drains.
- Keep storm sewer drains clear of leaves, grass clippings, sticks and litter.
- Clean up your pet's waste and throw it away.
- Repair leaks from your vehicle and recycle motor oil.
- Clean up spills DO NOT wash them into storm drains.
- Minimize the use of fertilizers, pesticides and herbicides.

All of us benefit from clean water, and all of us play a role in keeping our lakes, rivers, wetlands and groundwater clean. #### Proper mulch placement

Placing mulch around trees can improve soil structure, reduce weeds and slow evaporation of soil moisture. This keeps soil nutrients and moisture available for the tree's root systems to help them thrive. Proper tree mulching involves placing a 2-4" layer of mulch over the root zone in a saucer-like fashion. The tree's trunk should be allowed to stay dry by keeping mulch away from it. This prevents decay and insect or rodent damage, but permits moisture for the roots. Improper tree mulching can actually be harmful to a tree. Excessively deep mulch may decrease the flow of oxygen to the roots, resulting in smothering and root system decay.





#### Wood chips available

Using branches collected through tree trimming and brush pickup programs, the Village makes wood chips available free to residents throughout the year. Wood chips make an excellent mulch for trees, shrubs and planting areas. Residents may pick up wood chips during daylight hours at the Fleet Maintenance Facility located at 2405 Pembroke Ave., Monday through Friday after 3 p.m. or anytime on Saturdays and Sundays. Residents should bring a shovel and their own container(s). Proof of residency is required. Wood chips may also be delivered as a full or half load by Public Works. For questions, call 847-490-6800.




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#### **SAFETY TIPS**

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Weep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- Xeep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- >>> Never leave your grill unattended.
- Mays make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

#### **CHARCOAL GRILLS**

- There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- ))) If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- Weep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.


### **PROPANE Grills**

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not move the grill.

If the flame **goes out**, turn the grill and gas off and wait at least **5 minutes** before re-lighting it.

#### **FACTS**

- (1) July is the peak month for grill fires.
- Roughly half of the injuries involving grills are thermal burns.
