Fire Department assists hearing-impaired resident with special equipment

Early alerting is critical when it comes to protecting against smoke, fire or carbon monoxide within the home.



As her hearing-impaired daughter sought more independence in her teen years, Hoffman Estates resident Isela Marquez was reluctant to leave her daughter Dulce home alone for fear that there would be no one around to hear a smoke detector go off and get her to safety. After researching smoke detection options for hearing-impaired individuals, Isela called the Fire Department to see if they could provide assistance with the equipment and installation.

Promoting safety and fire protection for each and every resident is fundamental to the mission of the Hoffman Estates Fire Department, so when Isela's request came in for assistance to make her home safer, the Fire Department worked with employees and contractors to help.

A grant acquired by the Fire Department from Walmart, along with in-kind donations from Firefighters Local 2061 and

Arrow Electric, were used to purchase and install specialized smoke and carbon monoxide detectors with strobe lights that activate when an emergency occurs. A bed shaking alarm is also part of the interconnected system designed to alert the teen in case of a fire or carbon monoxide emergency.

"We are very happy that we are able to provide this service to the family, and that they are now protected," said Fire Chief Alan Wax. "I am proud of the work that our members did here to meet this family's special fire protection needs."

The Hoffman Estates Fire Department, in partnership with the Illinois State Fire Marshal, has a program in place to assist residents in need, or with special needs, with smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. Contact the Fire Department at 847-843-4825 to request more information about this program.

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Make sure your address is visible

Emergency services personnel need to quickly locate and easily read your address to provide emergency and other services to you. Help us protect you, your property, and your family by making sure your address is correctly displayed and easily readable.

Village Code calls for residential properties to have street numbers posted that are visible from 100 feet away, and it prohibits all buildings and developments from displaying numerical identification other than the actual street address.



Historian's notebook

As soon as the weather warms up and we head outdoors to garden, picnic or just sit on the front porch, we learn to check the weather forecast before we head out for the day. Especially now, with concerns about climate change, the weather seems to be getting a little bit wilder with frequent warnings of possible tornadoes popping up when thunderstorms are in the area.

Many of us believe that it can't happen here, but tornado-like winds did \$500,000 worth of damage on a Friday evening, July 14, 1972. There was a tornado watch in place that night, along with a severe thunderstorm warning. While we had no problems in my family's neighborhood that night, many areas of town were hard-hit.

The Herald for Hoffman Estates-Schaumburg reported the Friday night storm on the front page of the July 17, 1972 issue, with the headline reading "\$500,000 Storm Damage Comes To Hoffman Estates." The story reported, "The path of destruction began at Berkley Ln. near Grand Canyon Parkway, hop scotching its way toward Conant High School which went untouched by the storm." Damage was most extensive along Berkley Ln., leaving many duplex owners unable to return home. One duplex sustained heavy damage, while the other duplex was left completely unharmed.

Fairview Elementary School on Arizona was extensively damaged, with broken windows and large sections of the roof torn off. According to then-Fire Chief Carl Selke, whose home was seriously damaged, the storm hit at 11 p.m. Fences along Roselle Rd. had sharp pieces blown off that were later found in a pile several houses away, and a storage shed was lifted up and thrown across the street. "All across parcel C, cars were found damaged; garages collapsed and swimming pools were devastated," the Herald reported. One swimming pool was found atop a telephone pole, and some of the siding from a home was found hanging from electric lines on Saturday morning.

Gas lines were reported broken across the area, but no fires started from this damage. Firefighters, police officers and civil defense worked into the night to clean up the destruction and secure the area. Chief Carl Selke commented that "I don't know how lucky we can get."

That storm was 51 years ago. It was eventually reported as an F1 tornado by the weather bureau. Tornadoes can happen here in Hoffman Estates, so be sure to keep your eye on the weather forecast.

Updated, modern building codes adopted

The Village of Hoffman Estates prides itself on being at the forefront of modern building codes. These codes help protect the buildings and properties in the Village from disasters like fires, weather-related events, and structural collapse. Building codes are the best way of protecting homes, offices, schools, manufacturing facilities, stores, and entertainment venues.

The Building & Code Enforcement Division is tasked with administering the building codes through permits and inspections. Routinely updating these codes is an essential exercise for the Village. With the rate building practices, products, and standards change, having the most current tools available increases staff's ability to effectively enforce codes to ensure buildings and properties are safe.

This past June, the Village adopted the 2021 International Codes (I-Codes) and the 2020 National Electric Code (NEC). The adoption of these codes, which are the most current codes available, keeps the Village in line with its 6-year adoption cycle for building code updates.

Growing to Greenness!

Ten Facts about **Storm Water**

- Storm sewers are designed to collect rainwater runoff only.
- 2. Water entering the storm sewer system is not treated before moving into downstream waterways (ponds, creeks, wetlands, etc.).
- 3. All open grated drains that can collect surface water are part of the storm sewer system.
- 4. Sump pumps that collect surface water or ground water from the house perimeter discharge into the storm sewer through surface runoff or direct pipe connection.
- 5. All interior house drains, including floor drains and ejector pump discharges, do not enter the storm sewer system. These sources enter a separate sanitary sewer system that flows to a water treatment plant before releasing into downstream waterways.
- Dumping of any pollutants or waste into a storm sewer is never permitted and can pollute downstream waterways.
- Runoff may become polluted as it runs along roads, parking lots, roofs, lawns and construction sites.
- 8. Runoff may contain pollutants, such as automotive fluids, fertilizers and pesticides, leaves, sediment, litter and pet waste.
- Please do your part to keep storm water clean!
 Everyone can help reduce the amount of pollution carried in storm water.
- Report illegal dumping or spills by calling the Public Works Department at 847-490-6800 or emailing <u>publicworks@vohe.org</u>. Use the Police non-emergency number, 847 882-1818 after 4 pm on weekdays or on weekends.

Annual **Recycling** Event

Hoffman Estates is hosting its free annual recycling drop-off and document destruction event on Saturday, August 26, from 9 a.m. to noon at the Public Works Center, 2305 Pembroke Avenue.

Residents should remain in their vehicles while attending this event, and workers will unload recyclables from vehicles. Paper documents should be contained in paper bags or small cardboard boxes – not in plastic bags. If a resident has a variety of materials to recycle, please keep them separated in the back of the vehicle to ensure items are recycled properly. Accepted items include textiles, medications and sharps, batteries, printer cartridges, and fluorescent light bulbs.

Paper Shredding

Only sensitive documents will be accepted, including medical records, bank statements and tax forms. Do not include magazines, greeting cards or newspapers, as these can be recycled curbside. Paper is cross-shredded on site. Residents are limited to six file-size boxes or grocery-size paper bags of documents. Plastic, metal clips and binders should be removed. Do not bring paper in plastic bags. Plastic is a contaminant, as are photos, slides and any non-paper item.

Electronics Recycling

Remove electronics from plastic packaging and boxes before the event. Accepted electronic items include cable and satellite receivers; cell phones and tablets; computers and computer equipment/components (e.g., cables, keyboards, monitors, etc.); fax machines, printers and scanners; MP3 players; TVs; video game consoles; video recorders/players; and Zip drives.

Items NOT accepted include air conditioners; CDs, DVDs or VHS tapes; humidifiers/dehumidifiers; lamps; microwaves; refrigerators and other large home appliances; speakers; stereos; and vacuum cleaners.

Additional Services

In addition to electronics, the Village will be accepting these items for recycling:

- Textiles and small household goods through Simple Recycling (new or used clothing; boots and shoes; belts and ties; handbags; hats and gloves; toys; towels; sheets and blankets; small kitchen appliances; and more)
- Expired drugs/sharps
- Fluorescent and compact fluorescent lamp (CFL) light bulbs
- Batteries
- Printer cartridges
- Latex (water-based) paint:
 - Quarts: \$2.99
 - One-gallon containers: \$5.99
 - Five-gallon buckets: \$19.99

NOTE: flammable materials will not be accepted.

- Blood pressure and pulse check: free.
- Diabetes (blood sugar): \$2
- Hemoglobin (anemia): \$3

Cholesterol screening

This FASTING test measures total cholesterol, HDL, LDL, triglycerides and glucose levels. It requires a small drop of blood. Results are immediate, and include consultation with a nurse. The cost is \$22.

Hemoglobin A1C screening

The Hemoglobin A1C test is a simple finger stick to find out if you are at risk for or have diabetes by measuring your average blood sugar levels over the past three months. The test takes 6 minutes and the cost is only \$15.

Children and baby clinics

Health and Human Services offers several vaccination clinics for babies and children. Each child will receive an individual appointment time. Please visit our website for vaccine specific appointment procedures.

Bicycle **Safety Tips**

Bicycling is a great activity for the entire family. Before setting out on a biking trip, consider the following safety recommendations from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA).

- Wear a bicycle helmet. Everyone, at every age, should wear bicycle helmets.
- Adjust your bicycle to fit. When standing over your bicycle, there should be 1 to 2 inches between the rider and the top tube (bar) if using a road bike, and 3 to 4 inches if using a mountain bike. The seat should be level front to back and the height should be adjusted to allow a slight bend at the knee when the leg is fully extended. The handlebar height should be level with the seat.
- Check your equipment. Before riding, inflate tires properly and check that the brakes work.
- See and be seen. Whether daytime, dawn, dusk, bad weather, or at night, make yourself visible to others. Wear neon, fluorescent or other bright colors when riding to be most easily seen. Wear something that reflects light, such as reflective tape or markings, or flashing lights. Remember, just because you can see a driver does not mean the driver can see you.
- Control the bicycle. Ride with two hands on the handlebars, except when signaling for a turn.
- Watch for and avoid road hazards. Look for hazards such as potholes, broken glass, gravel, puddles, leaves and dogs. All these hazards can cause a crash.
- Use verbal and non-verbal communication. This
 includes eye contact with drivers, using turn
 signals, pointing to road hazards for bicyclists
 behind you and communicating with others
 "passing on your left," or "on your left."
- Avoid riding at night. It is hard for drivers to see bicyclists at dusk, dawn, and nighttime. Use reflectors on the front and rear of your bicycle. White lights and red rear reflectors or lights are required by law in all states.

Hoffman Estates named Municipality of the Year by Illinois Real Estate Journal

The Village of Hoffman Estates was named 2023 Municipality of the Year by the Illinois Real Estate Journal at the Fourth Annual Real Estate Awards held June 1 in Rosemont. The award recognizes the economic progress in the Village over the past year.

"We are extremely proud to be recognized by the Illinois Real Estate Journal as Municipality of the Year," said Mayor Bill McLeod. "From the Board of Trustees to our Village staff, this award is a reflection of the team effort it takes to advance a strong economic development program."



Major projects in Hoffman Estates over the past year include construction of Seasons of Hoffman Estates, the Village's first multi-family development project in over three decades; the completion of the first of two new 200,000 square foot data centers for Microsoft; and numerous businesses relocating to Bell Works Chicagoland, where over 250,000 square feet of space has been leased, or is in the process of being leased since 2021.

The Village also recently facilitated significant reinvestment in the retail sector, with Home Goods, Crumbl Cookies, and Bath & Body Works opening in 2022. New retail outlets for 2023 include two approved marijuana dispensaries – Spark'd Dispensary and Aroma Hill; two Popeye's Chicken restaurants; and a new Dunkin' Donuts.

"We are thrilled that the activity and work to be pro-development and pro-growth is recognized," said Economic Development Director Kevin Kramer. "This win isn't just for the Village, but for all the businesses who help make this a great community."

The Village was selected from a group of four finalist communities by the judges, a panel of distinguished real estate professionals. Hoffman Estates was also named Municipality of the Year by the organization in 2021, and was a finalist for the same award in 2022.



A few ideas to get into the patriotic spirit, without fireworks:

- 1. Use glow sticks, they glow in the dark and are a safe alternative to a sparkler. Fun for all ages.
- 2. Loud and proud. Noise makers are sure to make a statement. They can be found at local party supply stores or make your own.
- **3.** Outdoor movie night. Set up a screen and projector. Don't forget the bugspray!
- 4. Red, white and blue silly string...fun for all ages.
- 5. Make a patriotic craft with the family.
- **6.** Throw a birthday party for the USA, and don't forget the cake.



FACTS

- ① More than 19,500 reported fires are started by fireworks annually.
- ! Burns account for 44% of the 9,100 injuries treated in emergency rooms in the month around July 4.
- ! Half of the fireworks injuries seen at emergency rooms were extremities: hands, fingers, or legs. One-third were to eyes or other parts of the head.
- Children ages 10–14 had the highest rate of fireworks injury, with more than one-third (36%) of the victims of fireworks injuries under age 15.
- (!) Sparklers account for roughly one-quarter of emergency room fireworks injuries.

Trees can become **stressed** too

Are your tree leaves starting to droop a bit? Does it look like autumn already as the tree leaves turn yellow/brown and perhaps even fall to the ground? These are common signs of a tree undergoing heat stress. Trees experiencing heat stress are more susceptible to pests, which cause even further tree decline. Avoid stress by providing the tree with deep watering (softening the top 10" of soil) during the hot summer weather to encourage the formation of long, deep roots.

Tree Watering Tips:

- Avoid evaporation by watering in the early morning or, if necessary, in the early evening.
- Use a soaker hose or oscillating sprinkler to allow water to infiltrate the soil slowly for deeper watering. It may take a few sessions to loosen up over-dried soil.
- The area near the drip line (furthest extension of tree canopy) should be watered. This is where the root tips that bring moisture to the tree are located.
- Mature trees require deep watering twice a month in normal conditions.
- Newly planted trees require deep watering 1-2 times a week, contingent on precipitation received.
- In a drought situation, water more frequently, but be mindful of water use restrictions.

Trees contribute to better air quality, carbon storage, increased property values, energy savings and reduced storm water runoff. Trees beautify surroundings and bring the enjoyment of nature into your neighborhood. Be kind to your trees this summer and give them a drink of water!

Police Department Offering Public Safety Cadet Program

The Hoffman Estates Police Department will visit local high schools at the beginning of the 2023-24 school year to recruit new cadets for the Public Safety Cadet program.

Public Safety Cadets are young adults who aspire to careers in law enforcement. Police officers volunteer as advisors and mentors to train and offer guidance to cadets in all aspects of police work including traffic accident investigations, handling domestic disputes, processing crime scenes, building searches and arrest techniques.

Requirements for the Public Safety Cadets are as follows:

- Age 14 (completed 8th grade) but not more than 20 years of age
- Have good moral character
- · Remain in school and maintain a "C" average (70%) or higher
- Clean police record
- Ability to attend weekly cadet meetings
- Commitment to the Public Safety Cadet Code to exemplify the professional image of the Hoffman Estates Police Department.



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Hoffman Estates **mourns** longtime Trustee **Michael Gaeta**

It is with great sadness that the Village of Hoffman Estates announces the passing of longtime Trustee Michael Gaeta on May 21, 2023. He was 86.

A Veteran of the U.S. Army and an expert pilot, Trustee Gaeta was first elected to the Hoffman Estates Village Board in 2013 and was subsequently re-elected in 2017 and 2021. As Trustee, Gaeta served as Chairman of the Village's Public Health and Safety Committee, was Co-chair of the Village Green Ad-Hoc Committee, served as the Village's representative on the O'Hare Noise Compatibility Commission, and was a member of the Village's Commission for Senior Citizens.



Prior to serving on the Village Board, Trustee Gaeta served on the Village's Planning and Zoning Commission for three years and Zoning Board of Appeals for five years.

Born and raised in Cleveland, Ohio, Trustee Gaeta joined the Army after graduation from high school and was stationed in Germany for two-and-a-half years. He and his wife Johanna married in 1960, and have four children, six grandchildren and five greatgrandchildren. Trustee Gaeta held an Associate Degree from Fenn Community College in Cleveland.

Trustee Gaeta was a longtime member the Civil Air Patrol, rising up through the ranks to Lieutenant Colonel, where he was in charge of search and rescue missions. Gaeta owned his own airplane and was an instrument-rated pilot.

After retiring from a career in food service, Trustee Gaeta, along with Johanna, found post-retirement work as owner and operator of three distributorships for Seattle Sutton's Healthy Eating. Trustee Gaeta was the past President of the Illinois Chapter of the Food Service Executives Association, past Board Member of the National Association of Catering Executives, past Board member of the Waukegan Regional Airshow, and a past President of the Haverford Place Homeowners' Association in Hoffman Estates.
