Platzkonzert Germanfest returns for 17th year

The Platzkonzert offers residents of every background an exciting weekend with free admission, free entertainment and a play area for children – the Kinderplatz.



The festival will take place rain or shine at the Virginia Mary Hayter Village Green, 5510 Prairie Stone Pkwy., just north of the NOW Arena. Enjoy authentic German music and beer on Friday, Sept. 8, from 6 to 11 p.m.; Saturday, Sept. 9, from noon to 11 p.m.; and Sunday, Sept. 10, from noon to 6 p.m.

The Kinderplatz will offer free children's activities from noon to 5 p.m. on both Saturday and Sunday. In partnership with the Hoffman Estates Park District, Kinderplatz will feature arts, crafts, inflatables, and much more.

True to the Platzkonzert name, a full line-up of music is planned over the three-day fest. The on-site Hideaway Brew Garden will feature a selection of German craft beer and food options and commemorative mugs. Contests will take place throughout the weekend including the beer stein carry, stein hoisting, and costume contests on Saturday, and Dachshund races on Sunday.

Parking will be available in the lot east of the venue, off Pratum Avenue, in front of the Tate & Lyle building at 5450 Prairie Stone Parkway. Handicapped parking and shuttle service will be provided. Limited parking will also be available on Prairie Stone Parkway.

National **Community Planning** month

The goal of community planning is to maximize the health, safety and economic well-being of all people



living in our community. This involves thinking about transportation options, attracting and retaining thriving businesses, housing and opportunities for recreation. Planning helps create communities of lasting value.

While architects often focus on a single building, a planner's job is to work with residents and elected officials to guide the layout of an entire community or region. Planners take a broad view and look at how the pieces of a community — buildings, roads, and parks — fit together like pieces of a puzzle. Planners then make recommendations on how the community should proceed.

One of the greatest challenges for planners is to imagine what can and should happen to a community, how it should grow and change and what it should offer residents 10, 15, or even 20 years into the future.

The celebration of National Community Planning Month gives us the opportunity to publicly recognize the participation and dedication of professional planners, the members of planning commissions and other citizen planners who have contributed their time and expertise to the improvement of Hoffman Estates!

Historian's notebook

The development of new businesses in Hoffman Estates has brought back memories of the history of the area of town in which I live, the Highlands. When I moved here in 1965, I found myself living in Hoffman Estates but surrounded by the Village of Schaumburg.

Those early years of development in Hoffman Estates were confusing as to what was in Hoffman Estates and what was in Schaumburg. With earlier incorporation in 1956, Schaumburg had the opportunities to annex land. Hoffman Estates didn't incorporate until 1959 and the main roads of Higgins and Golf had already been incorporated by Schaumburg. This left the two villages with businesses across the street from one another. This left me with restaurants and businesses that I enjoyed in those early days that were typically in Schaumburg.

We had several restaurants that others may remember enjoying. Some of the best Chinese food could be found at the Black Pearl. While the Black Pearl is long gone, the building on the north side of Golf Road with the black glass windows, across from what was Golf Rose Shopping Center, is still there. Lumes was a great hot dog place with foot-long dogs steamed in beer. It was near the Black Pearl about where Napleton's Auto Dealer is now located.

Also on the north side of Golf Road was Rose's Landscaping. It was the place to go

for help with gravel, black dirt or anything you needed to finish your lawn, and was located where Ziegler's Auto Group now is. All of these businesses were located in Schaumburg.

I learned that Golf Rose Shopping Center, now Golf Center, located at the southwest corner of Golf & Roselle Roads, and Hoffman Plaza just across Roselle Road, were in the Village of Hoffman Estates. Sometimes I couldn't remember what town I was in. It didn't matter, I just enjoyed the good food and shopping.

Thinking back to those early days of shopping, I remembered that the Ace Hardware that opened just a few years ago had been the Eagle Grocery Store. Then I recalled that Popeye's had been here years ago, located where the Pita House has opened on the north side of Higgins Road, just east of Springmill Road in Schaumburg. When the new Popeye's opens, it will be in Hoffman Estates just at the foot of the old Hoffman Estates water tower at Golf and Roselle Roads.

The most surprising new business, with bright green windows, is located in the southeast corner of Hoffman Plaza. Who would have ever thought that years later the Robert Hall Village store would be a cannabis dispensary named Spark'd?

October is **Domestic Violence** and Intimate Partner Violence (IPV)

Awareness Month



Domestic violence is defined as "the willful intimidation, physical assault, battery, sexual assault, and/or other abusive behavior as part of a systematic pattern of power and control perpetrated by one intimate partner against another." Domestic violence includes emotional, psychological, physical, sexual, and financial abuse and is often perpetrated in private, away from the public. Domestic

violence affects women, men, and those across the gender spectrum. It is important to note that the majority of domestic violence/intimate partner cases include men inflicting violence on women, and one in three women experience domestic violence within their lifetime.

The Village's Health and Human Services Department joins agencies, counselors, psychologists, activists, law enforcement, and individuals working to increase awareness about domestic violence/IPV in an attempt to decrease the occurrences and the negative effects on the survivors, their friends, family, and the community.

Signs of Domestic Violence and Intimate Partner Violence Include:

- Hitting, kicking, biting, scratching, choking, smothering or any other physical violence.
- Limiting the partner's access to money or to the phone and isolating the partner from their social support.
- Attempting to make the partner feel worthless by insulting and name-calling. The
 purpose of this is to exert control and to make the partner less independent and less
 likely to leave.
- Engaging in sex after physical violence and/or forcing a partner to engage in sexual acts
- Intimidating the partner by threatening to hurt themselves or the partner.
- Harassment through email, text, phone, and in person.
- Harassment within the court system intended to drain financial resources of the partner.
- Engaging in projective identification, by projecting negative qualities that are unacceptable about the self onto others, making it seem like it is the survivor's fault.
- Behavior that continues even after a divorce or separation, as the perpetrator becomes fixated on punishing and harassing the ex-partner, attempting to maintain contact.

The Village of Hoffman Estates is committed to assisting victims and survivors of domestic violence/IPV. Health and Human Services partners with the Police Department to provide resources and support for those impacted by domestic violence. Even after much progress, there is still stigma, and we salute the survivors of domestic violence who speak up and ask for help. Domestic Violence/IPV not only impacts the partner and their children, it also impacts the safety of the entire community.

Cholesterol screening

This <u>FASTING</u> test measures total cholesterol, HDL, LDL, triglycerides and glucose levels. It requires a small drop of blood. Results are immediate, and include consultation with a nurse. The cost is \$22.

Hemoglobin A1C screening

The Hemoglobin A1C test is a simple finger stick to find out if you are at risk for or have diabetes by measuring your average blood sugar levels over the past three months. The test takes 6 minutes and the cost is only \$15.

Take the **first step** in **preventing** the flu

The flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses. Even healthy people can get the flu. Most of those who get sick will recover in less than two weeks, but it can be dangerous for people over the age of 65, young children, and individuals with chronic health conditions.

The best way to decrease the risk of flu and its complications is to get a flu vaccine each year. While a flu vaccine may not prevent all flu illnesses, it can decrease the severity of symptoms, reduce hospitalizations, and prevent deaths. The best time to get vaccinated is now, before flu starts circulating in the community.

Health and Human Services offers flu vaccines for children 6 months and older and adults, and high-dose flu vaccines for seniors 65 and older at Village Hall. Appointments are required. Visit portal.hoffmanestates.org to schedule an appointment through our new portal or call 847-781-4850 for more information.

Branch pickup resumes by zone on **Sept. 25**

The free curbside tree branch pickup program through Hoffman Estates Public Works begins on Monday, Sept. 25, starting with Zone A. This program is for residents covered by the Village refuse collection contract.

Please note that only one collection pass will be made for each street with no exceptions. If branches are too large, are mixed with unacceptable materials or have not been prepared properly, they will not be picked up

Public Works crews WILL accept:

- Tree branches no larger than 8 inches in diameter and/or 10 feet in length
- Shrub trimmings and similar brush
- Branches from willow trees if separated from other materials

Public Works crews WILL NOT accept:

- Tree trunks, stumps or root balls
- Firewood


- Railroad ties or landscape timbers
- Grass clippings, leaves, sod, plants or yard waste

On the first date of pickup listed for your zone, neatly stack branches at curbside by 7 a.m., facing the cut ends toward the street. Please do not tie branches in bundles or place in any container. Do not allow branches to protrude into the street or block sidewalks, street lights, street signs or mailboxes.

Once branches from your zone are picked up, the branch pickup concludes for this zone until the spring pickup.

While supplies last, free wood chips will be available to residents at the Village's Vehicle Maintenance facility, 2405 Pembroke Avenue, during daylight hours after 3 p.m., Monday through Friday, and during daylight hours on weekends. Please bring your own containers.

Floodplain information and services

Flooding can happen to anyone. Even if you do not live near a body of water or have never previously experienced flooding, a flooding risk may still exist. Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM) identify areas at higher risk of flooding, known as the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) (or commonly "floodplain").

FIRMs are prepared by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to identify flood zones and determine risk. The Village can assist homeowners, renters and business owners in determining if your home or business is located within a SFHA.

The Village offers a service that is free to anyone interested in obtaining information regarding the Village's FIRMs. Available information includes:

- Whether a property is in a Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) and if there may be a requirement to purchase flood insurance.
- FIRM flood zone, panel number, suffix, panel date and regulatory base flood elevation for a property.
- A map of the property with the flood zone overlaid.
- Additional flood map information, including floodways and regulatory requirements for development in a floodway.

- Local drainage issues or flooding sources not identified on the FIRM.
- Information regarding wetland and open space areas within the Village and regulations prohibiting development.

The goal of the map information service is to educate the community about the potential flood risk on a designated property, to improve floodplain management and to provide information about steps that can be taken to reduce losses as a result of potential flooding events.

Because Hoffman Estates is a participating community in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) Community Rating System (CRS), property owners within the Village are eligible for flood insurance policies at discounted rates. Only a specific flood insurance policy will cover damage related to flooding. Policy details and rate information can be obtained through most insurance agents.

The FIRM panels are available for review at Village Hall or online at the FEMA Map Service Center at msc.fema.gov. Additional resources are also provided on the official NFIP website at floodsmart.gov.

Open Houses kick off Fire Prevention Week in Hoffman Estates

Help the Hoffman Estates Fire Department kick off Fire Prevention Week by attending Fire Station Open Houses this October. Help us to raise fire prevention awareness and help create a safer community by joining us for station tours, fire sprinkler demonstrations, vendor booths and to practice hands-on skills with a CPR station and fire extinguisher use with a live fire simulator. Activities for children include sliding down the fire pole, touch-a-truck, and a firefighter obstacle course. Sparky the Fire Dog will be there, and the Air Methods aeromedical helicopter will land next to Firehouse 23.

Fire Station Open Houses run from 1 to 4 p.m. on the following dates:

- Saturday, Oct. 14: Firehouse 23, 1300 Westbury Drive
- Saturday, Oct. 21: Firehouse 24, 5775 Beacon Pointe Drive



Lithium-ion batteries supply power to many kinds of devices including smart phones, laptops, e-scooters and e-bikes, e-cigarettes, smoke alarms, toys, and even cars. If not used correctly, or if damaged, these batteries can catch on fire or explode.

The problem

- These batteries store a large amount of energy in a small amount of space.
- Sometimes batteries are not used the right way; batteries not designed for a specific use can be dangerous.
- Like any product, a small number of these batteries are defective. They can overheat, catch fire, or explode.

Safety Tips

- Purchase and use devices that are listed by a qualified testing laboratory.
- Always follow the manufacturer's instructions.
- Only use the battery that is designed for the device.
- Put batteries in the device the right way.
- Only use the charging cord that came with the device.
- Do not charge a device under your pillow, on your bed, or on a couch.
- Do not keep charging the device or device battery after it is fully charged.
- Keep batteries at room temperature when possible. Do not charge them at temperatures below 32°F (0°C) or above 105°F (40°C).
- Store batteries away from anything that can catch fire.

Signs of a Problem

Stop using the battery if you notice these problems: odor, change in color, too much heat, change in shape, leaking, or odd noises. If it is safe to do so, move the device away from anything that can catch fire. Call **9-1-1**.

Battery Disposal

- Do not put lithium-ion batteries in the trash.
- Recycling is always the best option.
- Take them to a battery recycling location or contact your community for disposal instructions.
- Do not put discarded batteries in piles.

Charging an E-bike

Charge your battery in a flat, dry area away from children, direct sunlight, liquids, tripping hazards, and in a location where the e-bike is not at risk of falling.

Home Fire Sprinklers

Over 80% of fire deaths occur in homes. Home fire sprinklers can save lives and property from fire. They respond quickly and effectively to fire, often extinguishing the fire before the fire department arrives. Only the sprinkler closest to the fire will activate, spraying water on the fire.

Safety Tips

- Home fire sprinklers save lives and property. In many situations, a family who has survived a fire where a sprinkler is activated will have their house and enough of the items and spaces within in their home in such a condition that they can continue living their lives as they did before the fire.
- The cost of a home fire sprinkler system in a new home averages \$1.35 per sprinklered square foot, totaling an amount similar to what is spent for carpet upgrades, paving stone driveway or a whirlpool bath.
- A home fire sprinkler system can reduce a homeowner's insurance premium.
- Fire departments typically use roughly 10 times as much water as a fire sprinkler would use to contain a fire.
- Fire sprinklers are environmentally friendly. They can reduce the amount of water run-off and pollution, water usage to fight a home fire by as much as 91%, and fire damage by up to 71%.
- Cigar smoke or burnt toast will not activate a fire sprinkler. Only the high temperature of a fire will activate the sprinkler.
- A home fire sprinkler system is easy to maintain.
 Just inspect your home to make sure the sprinklers
 are not blocked by something that would prevent the
 water from coming out, such as paint, and be sure
 the main control valve is never turned off.
- Home fire sprinklers are effective in cold and warm climates. Guidelines have been created for the proper installation of systems to avoid pipes freezing. A home fire sprinkler system should be winterized the same as you winterize a domestic water supply.


- → More than **2,500** people die in home fires each year.
- → If a home fire occurs, the risk of dying decreases by about 80% when the home is equipped with a fire sprinkler system.

Hoffman Estates **Police**: **Beware** of Scams

The Hoffman Estates Police Department has received a number of reports of scammers posing as representatives of the Village of Hoffman Estates and offering "work at home employment" opportunities via Facebook. These scammers will ask for private personal information as part of what they call an "employment screening process." Once the unsuspecting victim has obtained the false job, the scammers then ask the victim to advertise properties on Facebook Marketplace for "rent" when in fact they are privately owned properties that are not for rent.

In a separate scam, victims are contacted by scammers claiming to be with the Internal Revenue Service, United States Border Patrol and other law enforcement, or Federal agencies requesting "fees" via Bitcoin or gift cards. In an attempt to further their so-called authenticity, they will also "spoof" the Hoffman Estates Police Department non-emergency phone number so that the Hoffman Estates Police Department phone number displays on the caller ID when the phone call is received.

Purchase pet tags by November 1






Patrick Kinnane appointed **Trustee** on Village Board
