Over 95% of child seats are installed wrong in vehicles. Make sure yours is right.

The Hoffman Estates Police Department provides **car seat checks** on a limited basis. Call 847-882-1818 and ask for a child seat technician to schedule an appointment.

What Child Seat Is Right To Use?

- Infants under at least 20 lbs <u>and</u> 1 year should have a **child seat that faces the rear** of the car in the back seat. Infants are safer facing the rear. If you have a child seat that can stay rear facing to a greater weight, you should do so.
- When facing forward, a child seat with harness system should be used for children until the child is a minimum of 40 lbs. Some new child seats have a harness system rated to more than 40 lbs.
- When children outgrow the harness system, they should transition into a booster seat.
- Children can be moved from a booster seat
 when they outgrow it (either by weight or
 height) and then should use an adult
 lap/shoulder belt system. Children best fit the
 car's seat belt when they can sit with their back
 against the vehicle seat, with legs comfortably
 bent over the front edge of the seat, with the
 shoulder belt not riding too high on their neck.

Always read the child seat manual as well as the car's owners manual for any warnings or exceptions.

Remember: Children under 12 should always be in the back seat!



Rules to Parent By

Smoke-Free Environment

No one should smoke around your baby. Babies and young children exposed to smoke have more colds, other diseases and an increased risk of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS).

Back-to-Sleep


One of the best ways to protect your baby against SIDS is to put your baby on his or her back to sleep, even for naps.

Tummy Time

Place your baby on his or her stomach when he or she <u>is awake</u> and someone is watching. This positioning helps make your baby's neck and shoulder muscles stronger.

Never Shake a Baby!

Shaking a baby can cause blindness, brain damage, loss of hearing, internal bleeding, and even death. Educate individuals who take care of your child about the dangers of shaking infants. Inform care takers that they should call you or a family member if they cannot calm your baby.





Product Safety

Many products are developed with babies in mind, however using them incorrectly or in a way that was not originally planned for them may turn into a dangerous product for your baby. Keep the following in mind when using and choosing products.

Back Carriers: Do not use a back carrier until the baby is 4 or 5 months old. Before this time, the baby's neck cannot withstand the jolts and use can result in injury.

Baby Bath Rings or Seats: Never leave a baby unattended or with a sibling in a tub of water. Do not rely on a bath ring to keep your baby safe.

Changing Table: Never leave a baby on a changing table unattended! Always use the straps to prevent the baby from falling.

Cribs: Do not place cribs near draperies or blinds where the child could become entangled and strangle on the cords. When the child reaches 35 inches in height or can climb and/or fall over the sides of the crib, the crib should be replaced with a bed.

Gates and Enclosures: To avoid a baby's head from being trapped, do not use accordion-style gates or expandable enclosures with large v-shaped openings along the top edge, or diamond shaped openings within.

Strollers and Carriages: Always secure the seat belt! Never leave a child unattended in a stroller. Keep children's hands away from pinching areas when the stroller is being folded or unfolded.

Bassinets and Cradles: Bassinets and Cradles are designed for specific baby weights and heights. Follow the manufacture's guidelines on weight and size of the baby to safely use these products.

Vision And Hearing Testing
