Get ready to roll with Hoffman in Motion

The Village of Hoffman Estates is working to improve transportation options for all residents with the launch of *Hoffman in Motion*, a comprehensive transportation planning process. Community feedback is an important part of the plan, so there are several opportunities for stakeholders to provide input.

A transportation survey is currently open online at hoffmaninmotion.com/engage to give everyone a voice in shaping the future of transportation in Hoffman Estates. This survey will only take a few minutes, allowing respondents the opportunity to share their thoughts and experiences with transportation in Hoffman Estates. A signup form to receive regular project updates via email is also available on the *Hoffman in Motion* website.

The project team, including consultants and Village staff, will also hold community pop-up events to gather feedback. These events will be held during the Senior Commission lunch at Village Hall on May 15, at the Crank Revolution Wednesday group bike ride on June 12, and at the Summer Sounds on the Green concert on June 20.

The Hoffman in Motion plan will guide the future of travel in Hoffman Estates and will consider alternative transportation modes, such as walking, biking, and public transit, to make daily travel more convenient for everyone. Overall, the project aims to expand transportation options, improve connections between key destinations, enhance access in underserved areas and advance pedestrian and cyclist safety.

Village named **Tree City USA** for 33rd consecutive year

For the 33rd year, the National Arbor Day Foundation has named the Village of Hoffman Estates a Tree City USA. The National Arbor Day Foundation, in cooperation with the National Association of State Foresters and the U.S. Department of Agriculture Forest Service, sponsors the Tree City USA program. To be designated a Tree City USA, Hoffman Estates must annually meet the following standards:

- Have an established tree board or department
- Have a tree care ordinance
- Have a community forestry program with an annual budget of at least \$2 per capita
- Have an Arbor Day observation and proclamation

A municipality's designation as a Tree City community strongly contributes to a community's pride and value in their private and public property. Hoffman Estates continues to provide a level of stewardship necessary to build not only a great community today, but to plan for the future.

The Tree City USA program is a nationwide movement that provides the necessary framework for communities to manage and expand their urban forestry. This program has been greening up cities across America since 1976.

Historian's notebook

As I notice more and more Amazon, UPS and FedEx trucks going up and down our local streets, I think back to the days when home delivery of certain groceries was a standard occurrence in 1965 when I moved here from

Many women were stay-at-home moms back then, including myself. Many families could only afford one car, and that went to work with our husbands, leaving the women at home with no way to get to the stores to shop. What we all loved was the convenience of having food delivered to our doors. Of course the main man was the milkman. He and the juice man put insulated metal boxes on our front porch to hold their cold products. Hedlins Dairy and the Home Juice Co. came on different days, so I never had too much to carry into the house. The milkman would also bring eggs, butter, cottage cheese and cream if you needed them - just left a note in the box for him and it was delivered the next visit! Milk deliveries ended for many of the local dairies in 1989 when raw milk prices increased to the point where home deliveries were too expensive to continue their services to individual homes.

The Home Juice Co. is still in business in Melrose Park, IL. They began their business in 1946 and continue to this day. The kids always looked forward to the Home Juice delivery more than the milk. They had their favorites, and I remember that grape juice was one they always wanted me to order. Personally, orange juice was always at the top of my list. Everything was bottled in glass back then, and the bottles were heavy and subject to breaking. It was so nice to just put the washed bottle back in the

box for the delivery man to reclaim, and not have to worry about taking it back to the store.

My favorite home delivery man was from Jewel home delivery. I would order many food items from him, and we had our favorites. Chili wheel dinner and do-it-yourself homemade pizza with sauce and cheese in the box are two that I clearly remember from back in the day. I learned that Jewel was started back in 1899 by brothersin-law team Frank Skiff and Frank Ross, who began the business of delivering tea, coffee, spices and extracts with their horse and wagon. By the time of Jewel's 50th anniversary, they had 1,800 home delivery routes across 43 states and 150 retail stores in the Chicago area. The Jewel home delivery man ended his connection with the stores in 1981, but continued to run his deliveries as an independent dealer with food supplies still coming from the Jewel headquarters in Barrington, IL.

I had heard of another delivery company called Schwan Food Company. I never ordered from them, but learned of them from my daughterin-law who raved about their pies. Pizza was another favorite. Schwan's ice cream also had a lot of fans. They still deliver to the area and can be found online with products and prices. Ever since the COVID-19 pandemic, we find food delivery available everywhere. The only change is that delivery of food can be done in the grocer's parking lot or to your home if you choose. Food delivery is still a welcome addition to our busy lives just as it was back in 1965.

Building **permit portal**: create an account

Building permit applications are processed online through the Village's eTRAKiT permit portal. Online permit submittals ensure a faster and more streamlined process that makes it easier to obtain permits and correspond digitally with multiple reviewers. The portal can be accessed at hoffmanestates.org/permits.

The eTRAKiT system requires residents and contractors to create an account online to apply for permits and to schedule associated inspections. Public eTRAKiT accounts can be created at any time for homeowners who are self-performing the work. Residents planning to hire a contractor for an upcoming construction project should ensure that the company is aware of this requirement. All contractors must contact the Village in order to activate their accounts for the first time.

Building & Code Enforcement staff are available to help guide residents and contractors through the registration and submittal process. To get started, email buildingpermits@vohe.org or call 847-781-2631.

May is **Building Safety** Month

The International Code Council (ICC) sponsors Building Safety Month every May to raise awareness about building safety. This month-long educational campaign highlights how important it is for municipalities to adopt modern building codes and raises awareness about the importance of building codes in establishing and ensuring the safety of the built environment.



One of the main goals is to educate the public on what it takes to create safe and sustainable structures. A different area of building codes is showcased each week during Building Safety Month, stressing their importance to the safety and security of buildings for safer and better living. This year's theme, "Mission Possible," encourages people to get involved in all aspects of building safety.

The Village of Hoffman Estates utilizes building codes to protect residents from disasters like fires, weather-related events, and structural collapses. Building codes offer the best way to protect spaces where we live, work, play and learn, through the issuance of building permits and regular inspections.

This year, the State of Illinois has adopted the Illinois Energy Conservation Code 2021 to promote enhanced energy efficiency and energy related savings. Adopting these ICC codes reinforces our commitment to having buildings constructed and maintained within the Village held to the highest standards. Rental **Assistance** Available

A rental assistance program is still available for Hoffman Estates residents affected by the COVID-19 pandemic, but only a short amount of time remains for this program. Grants up to \$12,000 are available for moderate and low-income Hoffman Estates residents who experienced a pandemic-related hardship and are behind on rent. Residents may be eligible if they meet the following criteria:

- Household income is at or below 80% of the area median income
- A rental unit is the primary residence in the Village of Hoffman Estates
- Can provide proof of financial hardship due to COVID-19
- Are currently behind on rent

The program is sponsored by the Village of Hoffman Estates using federal HUD/CARES Act CDBG-CV funds and is administered by the North West Housing Partnership (NWHP), a non-profit agency. There are only a few more months of this program, so please check with NWHP promptly. For further details, please contact NWHP at 847-969-0561 or visit nwhp.net.



Protect Yourself from "Storm Chasers" After a Natural Disaster

With private property damage reports made following the Feb. 27 severe weather event that included two confirmed tornado touchdowns in Hoffman Estates, property owners are urged to be aware of companies or individuals who may try to take advantage of residents and business owners with "storm chaser" scams.



There have been instances of contractors

claiming they can repair the damage quickly and cheaply, and they advise potential customers against getting permits. They may scam property owners into providing down payments and perform subpar, noncompliant work, or skip town without any way to hold them accountable.

The Better Business Bureau has some great tips for property owners, including:

- Contact your insurance company first.
- Do your research get referrals from friends and neighbors.
- Resist high-pressure sales.
- Be especially careful of door-to-door contractors.
- Don't sign over insurance checks to contractors.
- Be wary regarding places that you can't see.

The Village's Building and Code Enforcement Department also warns against allowing contractors to conduct free inspections, as unethical contractors may intentionally create damage to get work. The Village issues a solicitation license with photo ID badge after conducting background checks. Anyone knocking on your door without this license and ID would be another red flag. Help protect birds in the environment

Spring brings longer days, warmer temperatures and migratory birds

back to our parks and yards. Mid-March marked the beginning of bird nesting season in the Midwest. While we enjoy watching them and hearing their songs, there has been a cumulative loss of 2.9 billion breeding adult birds that have vanished since 1970, according to Cornell Lab of Ornithology. The greatest losses are among the "common" birds, including sparrows, blackbirds, finches, and warblers.

There are many simple, easy actions to reduce global bird extinction by reducing habitat loss, impacting climate change, reducing unregulated harvest, and stopping human intervention.

- Apply decals or use screens to help birds identify windows.
- Plant native plants. Native plants offer food, shelter, and nesting areas.
- Avoid pesticides. Pesticides can be toxic to birds through direct contact or by eating contaminated seeds or insects.
- Protect the planet from plastics. Birds often ingest plastic or microplastics by mistaking them for food.

The Village of Hoffman Estates Cultural Awareness Commission is proud to host this year's Unity Day Festival of Cultures. 

Mindful Families Yoga Workshop



May is Osteoporosis Awareness Month

Adults have approximately 206 bones in their bodies. They contain blood cells, store minerals, and provide important functions such as structural support, assist with movement, or protect organs.

Bones are living tissues that are constantly growing and reshaping throughout life. As we age, we can lose more bone than we form. This can lead to osteoporosis, a condition where your bones become weak and porous, making them more prone to fractures and breaks. There are over 54 million Americans who are living with osteoporosis. Osteoporosis can affect men and women of all races. You can decrease your risk by engaging in weight-bearing exercise,

eating a diet rich in calcium and vitamin D, limiting alcohol, and not smoking.

The Village of Hoffman Estates now offers bone density screenings for all adults in the community. The screening uses measurements in a wrist or finger and takes less than five minutes. You will receive a copy of your results and a consultation with a nurse during the screening. The cost is regularly \$5, but will be offered FREE during the month of May. Early detection is an important part of lowering risk for stroke and cardiovascular disease. Life Line Screening can help detect leading causes of stroke and cardiovascular diseases including carotid artery disease, peripheral arterial disease, abdominal aortic aneurysm

Bicycle safety tips from the Hoffman Estates Police Department

Bicycling is a great activity for the entire family. Before setting out on a biking trip, consider the following safety recommendations from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA).

- Wear a properly fitted bicycle helmet. Everyone, of any age, should always wear a bicycle helmet.
- Adjust your bicycle to fit. Stand over your bicycle. There should be 1 to 2 inches between the rider and the top tube (bar) if using a road bike and 3 to 4 inches if using a mountain bike. The seat should be level front to back and the height should be adjusted to allow a slight bend at the knee when the leg is fully extended. The handlebar height should be level with the seat.
- Check your equipment. Before riding, inflate tires properly and check that the brakes work.
- See and be seen. Whether daytime, dawn, dusk, bad weather, or at night, make yourself visible to others. Wear neon, fluorescent or other bright colors when riding, to be most easily seen. Wear something that reflects light, such as reflective tape or markings, or flashing lights. Remember, just because you can see a driver does not mean the driver can see you.
- Control the bicycle. Ride with two hands on the handlebars, except when signaling a turn.
- Watch for and avoid road hazards. Look for hazards such as potholes, broken glass, gravel, puddles, leaves, and dogs. All these hazards can cause a crash.
- Use verbal and non-verbal communication.
 This includes eye contact with drivers, turn signals, pointing to road hazards for bicyclists behind you and communicating with others "passing on your left," or "on your left."
- Avoid riding at night. It is hard for road users to see bicyclists at dusk, dawn, and nighttime. If you must, have reflectors on the front and rear of your bicycle. White lights on the front and red rear reflectors or lights are required by law in all states.

Watering ban reminder

All outdoor water use is banned between 11 a.m. and 5 p.m. beginning May 15 through October 1. This ban includes lawn sprinkling, washing cars, filling swimming pools or any recreational use involving hoses. This ban complies

with state water conversation practices.
Violators can receive a citation, including a
\$50 fine for the first offense.





Proper mulch placement

Placing mulch around trees can improve soil structure, reduce weeds and slow evaporation of soil moisture. This keeps soil nutrients and moisture available for the tree's root systems to help them thrive. Proper tree mulching involves placing a 2 to 4 inch layer of mulch over the root zone in a saucer-like fashion. The tree's trunk should be allowed to stay dry by keeping mulch away from it. This prevents decay and insect or rodent damage but permits moisture for the roots. Improper tree mulching can actually be harmful to a tree. Excessively deep mulch may decrease the flow of oxygen to the roots, resulting in smothering and root system decay.

Memorial Day closure and garbage delay

Village Hall will be closed on Monday, May 27 in observance of Memorial Day. Garbage, recycling and yard waste collection will be delayed

by one day for the remainder of the week. Monday collection will occur on Tuesday, and Wednesday collection will take place on Thursday.




Construction Projects Map, project details available online

Charge into Fire Safety: Lithium-Ion Batteries



The Hoffman Estates Fire Department is working in coordination with the National Fire Protection Association® (NFPA®) to raise awareness about the risks associated with lithium-ion batteries and ways to minimize them. NFPA's new campaign, "Charge into Fire Safety,™" includes materials that address the concerns fire officials have about the growing number of fires caused by lithium-ion batteries which are increasingly found in the many devices and systems we use every day.

As the use of these items has increased in recent years, so too has the number of fires associated with them. NFPA and the Hoffman Estates Fire Department recommend these tips when buying, charging, storing, and using lithium-ion batteries to help prevent fires.

- Only purchase and use devices, batteries, and charging equipment that are listed by a nationally recognized testing lab and labeled accordingly.
- Use charging equipment that is only compatible with your device. To be safe, use only the charging equipment that is supplied with your device.
- Do not keep charging the device or device battery after it is fully charged.

- Do not put lithium-ion batteries in the trash.
 Recycling is always the best option. Take the batteries to a battery recycling location or contact your local waste hauler for disposal instructions.
- Stop using your device if the battery shows signs of damage, such as an unusual odor, excessive heat, popping sounds, swelling, or change in color
- Only have device repairs performed by a qualified professional.

"The Hoffman Estates Fire Department encourages residents to learn more about the hazards of lithium-ion batteries," said Fire Chief Alan Wax. "By better understanding how lithium-ion battery fires start, people can take the necessary steps to minimize associated risks and safely use their electronics and other devices powered by these batteries."
