The Village of Hoffman Estates partnered with ComEd to welcome Compass Datacenters to Hoffman Estates, as they held a kickoff event on June 13 for their first data center campus in Illinois. Among his remarks, Mayor Bill McLeod said that the Village is looking forward to working closely with Compass and with ComEd to bring this prime site, the former Sears Headquarters, into the modern era.

"One era ends and another one begins as we move into the growing digital economy," said Mayor McLeod. "We are very pleased to welcome Compass Datacenters as they open a new chapter for this high-profile property in our community."

The former Sears Corporation Campus in Hoffman Estates became home to the company in 1992, when they moved from their namesake Sears Tower in downtown Chicago. That original

development over 30 years ago transformed the west end of Hoffman Estates, bringing new roads, new tollway interchanges, infrastructure improvements, and a peak of 9,000 employees working in the community.

The campus was put up for sale in 2022 by property owner Transformco, the private holding company formed after Sears filed for bankruptcy in late 2018. Dallas, Texas based Compass Datacenters purchased the 197-acre campus in September 2023 with plans to construct the company's first data center complex in the state.

This redevelopment continues the technology diversification of the Village's tax base. Although preliminary, the investment by Compass in Hoffman Estates will be in the billions of dollars and will have positive effects for the community for years to come.

Historian'sNotebook

Congratulations to our Village of Hoffman Estates on its 65th year of incorporation. It was on September 23, 1959, that a vote of 759 to 569 settled the question of whether Hoffman Estates would become the incorporated Village of Hoffman Estates. This didn't happen until after the third time it was voted on.

Having lived here since 1965, I have seen incredible growth in our Village. From the quiet surrounding corn field, we've built a robust and very cosmopolitan community. Although we are a very busy Village with our share of traffic and shoppers, we are surrounded by parks and forest preserves. We have miles of bike paths and trails for walking, picnic areas and an atmosphere of quiet to savor. Because of all the open land in Hoffman Estates, you see animals of all sorts. We have deer, foxes, coyotes, raccoons and those stinky skunks. So many trees have matured and are home to many beautiful birds. The most surprising bird I have ever seen on my street was a wild turkey walking down the driveway without a care in the world.

We've been served by so many people we have elected over the years that I can't name all of them here. I can, however, name our seven mayors. Ed Pinger, our first mayor, served from 1959 to 1964; Roy Jenkins served from 1965 to 1969; Fred Downey served from 1969 to 1972; Virginia Mary Hayter served from 1973 to 1984; Betty Gloyd served from 1985 to 1988; Michael J. O'Malley served from 1989 to 1999; and William D. McLeod has served since 2000 to the present time.



Mayor McLeod was originally appointed after Mayor O'Malley died in office.

These mayors, along with the trustees who were elected to serve this Village, are the people who developed and built the Hoffman Estates that we live in today. We can never know the hard work, stress and creativity that helped them through the years they served us. Our thanks needs to go to all of them.

Congratulations to Mayor Bill McLeod for 44 years in office this September. Mayor McLeod was appointed as trustee on September 22, 1980, when Trustee Hank Bollman resigned. Thank you, Mayor, for a lifetime of service to the community!

Over the years we have seen people from all over the world settle in Hoffman Estates, drawn by excellent schools, great industries and a Village that is welcoming and supportive of all. Our Village continues "Growing to Greatness," by offering a wonderful life to all of us who call it home.

Federal Funding secured for **Central Road** construction project

As part of a collaboration between Congressman Krishnamoorthi's office and the Cook County Department of Transportation and Highways, \$500,000 in federal funding has been secured for the Central Road project in Hoffman Estates and neighboring South Barrington.

Mayor Bill McLeod and Trustee Gary Stanton joined Congressman Raja Krishnamoorthi, Cook County President Toni Preckwinkle, Cook County Commissioner Kevin Morrison, South Barrington Mayor Paula McCombie and many others on July 16 for the announcement that the federal funding was secured for this important infrastructure project.

"We appreciate the collaboration between Congressman Krishnamoorthi's Office and the Cook County Department of Transportation in seeing this project to completion," said Mayor McLeod. "The Central Road project is a long-awaited improvement that will benefit businesses and residents here in Hoffman Estates."

The 1.3-mile project will replace the pavement on Central Road with one 12-foot-wide through lane in each direction divided by a 16-foot-wide mountable median, as well as a new enclosed stormwater system.

The project will also add a new multi-use path along the north side of Central Road from the Paul Douglas Forest Preserves to the Pace Park-n-Ride multi-modal facility at Barrington Road. The new path will also connect to the existing paths to close the gap in the cycling network between the Pace facility and the forest preserve.

The Central Road project is expected to break ground in 2025 and will take approximately two years to complete.

Cholesterol Screening

This <u>FASTING</u> test measures total cholesterol, HDL, LDL, triglycerides and glucose levels. It requires a small drop of blood. Results are immediate, and include consultation with a nurse. The cost is \$22.

Hemoglobin A1C Screening

The Hemoglobin A1C test is a simple finger stick to find out if you are at risk for or have diabetes by measuring your average blood sugar levels over the past three months. The test takes 6 minutes and the cost is only \$15.

Influenza (flu) can be a very serious disease for you, your family, and friends — but you can lower your risk for severe complications by getting vaccinated. Everyone age 6 months and older is recommended to get a yearly flu shot. There are many different types of flu vaccine options, and Health and Human Services offers thimerosal-free flu shots as well as higher dose vaccines for older adults. Shots are free with Medicaid and Medicare, and only \$25 for all others. Influenza outbreaks each season are

- **9.** Stay positive!



Property Maintenance

The Village's Code Enforcement Division plays a crucial role in maintaining community standards and addressing property maintenance issues. Here are some common questions that are asked regarding property maintenance and code enforcement.

What types of violations do Code Enforcement Officers typically investigate?

The Village's three full-time Code Enforcement Officers handle a wide variety of cases throughout the year. The most common cases are tall grass and weeds, garbage toters, improper outside storage, inoperable vehicle storage, improper sump pump discharge and accessory structures built without permits. They also handle more complex cases such as building projects completed without permits and commercial property parking lot maintenance.

How do I report a possible code violation?

Residents may call 847-781-2631 to reach the code line or visit the Village website and select "I Want to..." to send a request for a possible violation to be investigated.

What happens if a code violation is found?

If a violation is found, the Code Enforcement Officer will contact the owner of the property with the needed corrective action, as well as a deadline for compliance.

How much time is given for correction?

Deadline dates vary depending on the type of violation that is identified. As examples, violations of tall grass and weeds are allowed five days for correction by ordinance, whereas a shed built without a permit will be given a longer timeline for compliance.

What should I do if I receive a notice about a violation on my property?

Residents with questions or concerns regarding property violations should contact the Code Enforcement Officer listed on the notice. Code staff are a resource to answer questions and help explain Village codes.

Garage sale permits

eliminated

The Village Board passed an ordinance in June 2024 eliminating the requirement for Garage Sale Permits. Sales may now be held without contacting the Village, however, there are still rules that apply to the number, days, and hours of garage sales, as well as where signs may be placed. Below is a reminder of the current codes covering garage sales in Hoffman Estates:

Regulations for garage sales

- A maximum of three (3) sales are allowed at the same address during the calendar year (January to December).
- Sales are only allowed on:Thursdays, Fridays, Saturdays, Sundays.
- Each sale may be held for a maximum of up to four (4) consecutive days (e.g., Thursday, Friday, Saturday, and Sunday).
- Sales shall begin no earlier than 8 a.m. and end by 6 p.m.
- Bulk sales, the sale of multiple new items of the same description and the sale of consigned merchandise, merchandise brought to the premises for resale or for reconditioning for resale are prohibited.



Signs

- Only one (1) on-site sign is permitted on the front lawn. Signs shall not be installed in the right-ofway/parkway (two (2) signs may be installed on corner lots, one on each street frontage).
- Up to two (2) directional signs may be allowed to be installed on private property, such signs shall not be in the parkway, and shall be installed only with the permission of the property owner.
- Signs are not permitted to be posted in any public right-of-way, or on any street sign or utility/light pole.
- Signs shall not be posted before 6 a.m. on the first day of the sale and shall be removed no later than 8 p.m. on the last day of the sale.
- Banners, balloons, streamers and the like are prohibited.

Pet license requirement eliminated

The Village Board approved an ordinance in June 2024 eliminating the requirement for pet licenses. Pet ownership no longer requires notifying the Village, however, the limit on the number

of combined dogs and cats remains at five total, as stipulated in the code. Importantly, rules for keeping dogs on leashes also remain in place.

Hoffman Estates encourages pet owners to consider microchipping their pets to better locate pets that leave property boundaries. Similarly, it is important for pets to receive preventative inoculations to prevent them from acquiring rabies and distemper.

A mobile Rabies and Microchip Clinic is scheduled for Saturday, Sept. 14 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., at the Schaumburg Township Offices, 1 Illinois Blvd., Hoffman Estates. This event is free for the first 100 pets and operates on a first-come-first-served basis. Owners must be Cook County residents and present a valid driver's license or state ID. Pets must be at least three months old and dogs must be leashed, whereas cats must be in carriers.

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Help prevent car burglaries: lock your car doors

The Hoffman Estates Police Department has seen a recent uptick in car burglary cases. The best way to help prevent your car from being burglarized is to lock your car doors and close all windows, including the sunroof, whenever you exit the vehicle. Here are some additional tips to avoid car burglaries:

- Take all valuables out of the vehicle, such as purses, phones, and electronics, whenever possible.
- If you must leave valuables in your vehicle, leave them in the trunk or out of plain sight.
- It is also highly recommended to not leave your garage door opener inside your vehicle if you are parking your vehicle outside.

If you see someone or something suspicious, please call 911.

In car burglary cases, typical behavior of offenders involves driving slowly through neighborhoods scoping out potential targets. They also will drive slowly while acting as lookouts and getaway drivers for accomplices.



Residents with surveillance cameras and/or surveillance style doorbells are encouraged to review their footage to see if there is any information to provide the Hoffman Estates Police Department to help identify car burglary suspects.



Police Department hosting **community meeting**

The Hoffman Estates Police Department is hosting a community meeting on Wednesday, Oct. 9 starting at 7 p.m. at the Hoffman Estates Police Department, 411 W. Higgins Road. This meeting is open to anyone who works or resides in the Village.

Community meetings provide the Police Department opportunities to work with the community to build trust, improve communication, and prevent crime. Attendees will interact with police officers and command staff to learn about current crime trends, get safety tips, ask questions, and share concerns.

Police drug drop box

Unwanted and expired medications can be dropped off in the special drug collection box located in the front lobby of the Hoffman Estates Police Department, 411 W. Higgins Rd. The drug collection box is accessible 24 hours a day, and is free to use. Only dry medications are accepted, no liquids or needles please.

Sharps are accepted for disposal the first Wednesday of the month at Village Hall from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. through the Health and Human Services Department. Please call 847-781-4850 for more information about sharps disposal.

Fire Department offering **CPR courses**

The Hoffman Estates Fire Department is offering Heartsaver CPR/AED courses on Saturday, Sept. 21 from 9 a.m. to noon and on Monday, Oct. 14 from 6 to 9 p.m. at Hoffman Estates Fire Station 24, 5775 Beacon Pointe Dr.


This course is intended for those with little to no medical training who want to learn CPR and AED use. Participants will learn when to phone 9-1-1, how to administer CPR, how to use an automated external defibrillator (AED), and how to provide relief from choking. The cost of the course is \$50 per person.

Escape planning

Plan ahead! If a fire breaks out in your home, you may have only a few minutes to get out safely once the smoke alarm sounds. Everyone needs to know what to do and where to go if there is a fire.

- Make a home escape plan, Draw a map of your home showing all doors and windows. Discuss the plan with everyone in your home.
- Have an outside meeting place (like a tree, light pole or mailbox) a safe distance from the home where everyone should meet.
- Practice your home fire drill at night and during the day with everyone in your home, twice a year.
- Teach children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them.
- Close doors behind you as you leave.

Branch pickup resumes by zone Sept. 23

The free curbside fall tree branch pick up program through Hoffman Estates Public Works begins on Monday, Sept. 23, starting with Zone A. This program is for residents covered by the Village refuse collection contract.

Please note that only one collection pass will be made for each street with no exceptions. If branches are too large, are mixed with unacceptable materials or have not been prepared properly, they will not be picked up.

Public Works crews WILL accept:

- Tree branches no larger than 8 inches in diameter and/or 10 feet in length
- Shrub trimmings and similar brush
- Branches from willow trees if separated from other materials

Public Works crews WILL NOT accept:


- Tree trunks, stumps or root balls
- Firewood
- Railroad ties or landscape timbers
- Grass clippings, leaves, sod, plants or yard waste

On the first date of pickup listed for your zone, neatly stack branches at curbside by 7 a.m., facing the cut ends toward the street. Please do not tie branches in bundles or place in any container. Do not allow branches to protrude into the street or block sidewalks, street lights, street signs and mailboxes.

Once branches from your zone are picked up, the branch pickup concludes for this zone until the spring pickup.

While supplies last, free woodchips will be available to residents at the Village's Vehicle Maintenance facility, 2405 Pembroke Avenue, during daylight hours after 3 p.m., Monday through Friday, and during daylight hours on weekends. Please bring your own containers.

Ten facts about **storm water**

- Storm sewers are designed to collect rainwater runoff only.
- 2. Water entering the storm sewer system is not treated before moving into downstream waterways (ponds, creeks, wetlands, etc.).
- **3.** All open-grated drains that can collect surface water are part of the storm sewer system.
- **4.** Sump pumps that collect surface water or ground water from the house perimeter discharge into the storm sewer through surface runoff or direct pipe connection.
- 5. All interior house drains, including floor drains and ejector pump discharges, do not enter the storm sewer system. These sources enter a separate sanitary sewer system that flows to a water treatment plant before being released into downstream waterways.
- **6.** Dumping of any pollutants or waste into a storm sewer is never permitted and can pollute downstream waterways.

- **9.** Please do your part to keep storm water clean! Everyone can help reduce the amount of pollution carried in storm water.
- **10.** Report illegal dumping or spills by calling the Public Works Department at 847-490-6800 or emailing publicworks@vohe.org. Use the Police non-emergency number, 847-882-1818 after 4 p.m. on weekdays or on weekends.
