POLICE DEPARTMENT MORTHLY REPORT

PATROL DIVISION ACTIVITY REPORT

During the month of June the Patrol Division responded to 832 calls for service. The following is a brief summary of some of the activities:

On O3 and 17 June A/Lt. Poulos taught the "Workplace Violence –When Lightning Strikes" program to approximately 70 township employees. This program teaches workers how to respond in a workplace violence situation as well as prevention measures.

On O4 June Officer Berman investigated a hit and run accident in which a bicyclist was struck by a vehicle. The driver of the vehicle fled the scene after grabbing a paper from a witness's hand who was writing down the offender's information. Officer Berman broadcast the offender's information and acting on a tip from Streamwood Police officers who recognized the vehicle's description completed a photo lineup of the possible offender. The victim and witnesses positively identified the offender. Officer Berman then located the offender, interviewed him, and gained a full confession. This offender was arrested and charged accordingly.



On O9 June Officer Dahlberg learned of information regarding two individuals who were wanted by the Secretary of State Police. Officer Dahlberg investigated this information and learned of the location of both subjects. Officer Dahlberg located the two subjects on the 2000 block of Botsford Place. Both subjects were taken into custody, processed accordingly and turned over to the Secretary of State Police.

On 15 June Officer Russmann responded to the 5200 block of Prairie Stone Parkway for a report of retail theft. Officer Russmann's investigation revealed that a subject entered the store and was recognized by staff as a person who had previously been arrested for retail theft. This subject was observed switching price tags from low priced items and placing them on high priced items. The subject then paid for the items using the lower priced tags. The subject was stopped by security and arrested by Officer Russmann for Retail Theft.

On 16 June Third Watch Officers were issued a request for volunteers to be trained for the child safety technician position. This position involves officers going to an intensive training course to receive certification in the proper installation of child safety seats per the National Traffic Safety Association guidelines. Officers selected for this position take on the additional responsibility of inspecting and teaching citizens in the proper use and installation of their child safety seats. Officers Matt Jones, Scott Lawrence, Brian Petersen, and Bryant Savage did not hesitate in volunteering for this (Continued on page 2)

Poulos represented the Department at an awards ceremony for the Illinois School Resource Officers Association Annual Conference when Officer Deb Whited (retired) was awarded a Meritorious Service Award by the Association in recognition of her years of hard work and dedicated service to the organization.

position. Their positive attitude and willingness to take on the additional responsibility for this community service position are well appreciated.

On 19 June Officer Rublev responded to the 700 block of Bode Road for a report of a battery that had just occurred. Upon arrival he discovered that the victim and her new boyfriend were alone together in the boyfriend's home when his ex-girlfriend entered the apartment with a key. An argument started and the ex-girlfriend battered the victim and then fled. Officer Rublev contacted the suspect and convinced her to come into the station. The suspect arrived and upon completion of the interview was arrested for Battery.

On 21 June Officer Johnson was in the area of Rt. 72 and Jones Road assisting the Schaumburg Police Department to locate a missing suicidal subject. The subject was off of his medication and last seen in a wooded area near Valley Lake Drive and Golf Road. Schaumburg PD called out a bloodhound and spent several hours looking for this subject before Officer Johnson located him.


On 23 June A/Lt. Poulos taught a "Rapid Deployment Tactics for Armed Violence" class to police officers at the annual Illinois School Resource Officer Association Conference.

On 24 June Sergeant Crimmins taught a juvenile law class to the attendees of the Illinois School Resource Officers Association Annual Conference. It is an honor for the Department to have Sergeant Crimmins' expertise be recognized and sought out by a state level association.

During the summer months, Watch 1 Officers, increased patrols in the Salem Ridge complex in an effort to improve quality of life for residents there. There have been a large numbers of calls in the complex due to drinking, drug use and gang activity. Watch 1 Officers make nightly foot patrol checks of the stairwells of each building and aggressively patrol the lots. A "zero tolerance" approach to public drinking was also adopted and already several citations have been issued.

CANINE UNIT REPORT

During the month of June, Officer Donohue and his K9 partner Bundo performed 5 vehicle searches, 4 community contacts, 3 tracks, 3 building searches, and 1 article search for a total of 16 calls. Six of the total calls were for outside agencies. During the month of June, Officer Donohue and his K9 partner Bundo also attended training with the Northwest Suburban K9 Training Group.



INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION REPORT

On O1 June Detective Hanna conducted follow up on a theft case in which he obtained suspect information from the victim and made contact with the suspect at her residence in Arlington Heights. Detective Hanna conducted an interview at the police station with the suspect and was able to obtain a full confession. Detective Hanna was able to recover the stolen iPod from the Cash Converters in Hoffman Estates and return it to the victim. The of-

fender was charged with misdemeanor Theft and this case was

cleared by arrest.

On O1 June Detective Ouimette continued an unlawful use of credit card case from May. The case was reported by a business located on the 5200 block of Prairie Stone Parkway.

The offender, a 41 year of resident of Miami, FL, purchased \$15.950.07 worth of merchandise and \$10,000 gift cards using a clone credit cards belonging to three different out-of-state victims. The offender was arrested in Washington County, WI, and found with the cloned credit cards in his possession. The Washington County Sheriff's Office conducted a search warrant on the offender's vehicle and located the merchandise that was purchased in Hoffman Estates using the cloned credit cards. Detective Ouimette went to the Washington County, WI, Sheriff's Office and recovered all the merchandised purchased by the offender using the cloned credit cards in Hoffman Estates. The total value of the recovered property was \$15,950.07. Criminal charges are pending further investigation against the offender who is being held on charges in Wisconsin.

On 06 June Detective Cawley was assigned a battery report which occurred on the 2300 block of Higgins Road. The suspect was located after video surveillance obtained in this investigation confirmed the account of this incident. The suspect, a 48 year old Schaumburg resident, was questioned at the station and subsequently confessed to battering the complainant. The suspect was charged with one count of Battery and this case was cleared by arrest.

On O9 June Detective Reichel assisted the Patrol Division by attempting to locate a missing suicidal adult who resides on the 1000 block of Englewood Lane. The despondent male adult had called his residence and was speaking incoherently to his wife tell-

ing her that he was parked in his vehicle and was drinking antifreeze. Detective Reichel assisted the Patrol Division by working with Cricket Wireless to obtain a location for the missing person. The man was subsequently located in Barrington on Rt. 14 and transported to the hospital for an evaluation. This case was cleared by recovery.

On 30 June Detective Ouimette gave a presentation for a Justice Administration Class at Westwood College. The content of the presentation included history of HEPD, Organizational Structure, Mission and Purpose, and hiring practices.

Detective Domin conducted 4 annual sex offender registrations in the month of June and one Administrative Service Officer background investigation.

JUVENILE INVESTIGATIONS REPORT

On 16 June Detectives Gad and Reichel attended a forensic interview at the Children's Advocacy Center reference a 12 year old resident of Hoffman Estates who made an outcry he had been sexually assaulted by an adult male Hoffman Estates resident on the 700 block of Alcoa Lane. Based on

information obtained during the forensic interview, Detectives conducted an interview with the suspect who subsequently confessed to abusing the victim. Felony review was contacted and one felony count of Predatory Criminal Sexual Assault of a Child was approved. This case was cleared by arrest.

TACTICAL UNIT REPORT

On O4 June Sergeant Scac- tempted to cianoce and Tactical Officer Donohue. The Cawley attended a Crime Free sequently arre Housing training in Palatine.

On 14 June Tactical Officers Teipel and Tenuto were patrolling in Area 5 when they were almost struck head on by a vehicle that was speeding and in their lane of traffic. Tactical Officers were able to stop the vehicle at which time the traffic stop turned into a narcotics investigation. The driver was subsequently arrested and charged with Felony Possession of Cannabis and traffic violations.

On 21 June Tactical Officer Tenuto observed a subject he recognized to have a valid warrant enter an Area 5 residence. T/O Tenuto called Officer Donohue for assistance at the residence. T/O Tenuto made contact at the door with a female subject who became belligerent and uncooperative with the officers. The subject during the course of the investigation kicked T/O Tenuto and at-

tempted to bite Officer Donohue. The subject was subsequently arrested and transported tp the police department. At the police department the subject became cooperative and called into the residence and



spoke with the subject who officers initially wanted to speak with regarding the warrant. The subject ultimately was contacted and exited the residence and turned himself into the police custody of Sergeant Scaccianoce. Both subjects were charged accordingly.

On 23, 25 and 28 June the Tactical Unit conducted surveillance on an Area 2 apartment complex after receiving several resident complaints of subjects smoking and selling cannabis.

Officer Tactical Officers Stoy and Cawley was subarrested three subjects who were found to be in possession of cannaartment. bis; one of the subjects indicated he ent the was selling narcotics and was tive and charged with Possession of Cannatice and bis with Intent to Deliver.



TRAFFIC SECTION REPORT

The following is a summary of activities for the Traffic Section for the month of June 2011.

On 14 June Officer Thomas was assigned a hit and run crash report that occurred in the 800 block of Roselle Road for follow-up. Officer Thomas obtained surveillance video footage of the crash but it did not reveal license plate information for the offender's vehicle. Officer Thomas conducted several partial license plate searches based on information from the original case report and located a suspect vehicle in Chicago, IL. Officers Thomas and Wondolkowski located the offender's vehicle in Chicago and spoke to the registered owner who confirmed his son was the driver during the crash. The offender was taken

into custody and provided statements. The driver was charged with Leaving the Scene of a Crash. This case was cleared by arrest.

Officer Marak installed 17 car seats for residents of the Village.

The Traffic Section followed up on 19 hit and run or incomplete crashes and 5 chauffeurs' license applications.




Good work

On 07 June 2011 Hope M. Morrison of Algonquin wrote:

"I'm writing to notify you of my experience with Officer Kura on the evening of 6/3. At approximately 7:10pm I was heading west on Higgins Road and unfortunately I hit a deer. Officer Kura arrived at the scene (Agency Crash Report #8717). I do not have enough kind words to explain how wonderful Officer Kura was during this horrible circumstance. My situation was a bit different as I was driving a rental car, and my car had been at the car dealer for repair (for almost 2 weeks). I live alone and didn't have anyone to come and pick me up. Officer Kura actually drove me to the car dealer so that I could pick up a loaner car, and then drove back to the scene of the accident to wait for the tow truck. Enterprise Rental explained that if no one was with the car when the tow truck arrived I would be liable for the car. The tow truck took over 2 hours to appear and Officer Kura was kind enough to wait with me on the side of the road. After I returned from the car dealer with the loaner car, I explained how I would be fine waiting alone for the tow truck. Officer Kura said eh would wait with me. I'm not sure if this is your standard protocol, but as time passed and the sun went down, it was dark out there on Higgins Road and I was relieved he stayed with me. Once the tow truck appeared Office Kura waited with me as the tow truck driver was a bit unusual. All in all, Officer Kura watched over me until about 10:00pm on Friday night. He was nothing but professional, kind, honorable, and so helpful. I feel he went above and beyond the standard call to an accident scene. Again, maybe he followed the standard procedure, but I was so thankful he was there and his assistance was invaluable to me in a time of stress. I wanted you to be aware of how grateful I was for his assistance and support."

On 23 June Chief Brian Howerton of the Schaumburg Police Department wrote:

"On June 21, 2011, at 0147 hours, the Schaumburg Police Department responded to an ill health call from a Schaumburg resident who was requested by his girlfriend to seek treatment for his extreme paranoia. The subject became aggressive, jumped out of the vehicle and ran. He stated he was going to leave and cut off his arm. An ISPERN and LEADS message was broadcasted. Hoffman Estates Police Officer Donohue and his K-9 Bundo were not successful tracking the subject; as a result the Illinois-Wisconsin Search and Rescue Dogs were called. While conducting the track, Officer Johnson of the Hoffman Estates Police Department located the subject at the Nissan Dealership in Schaumburg. The subject was transported to the hospital where he was admitted for an involuntary psychological evaluation. This incident was potentially dangerous, but was successfully resolved due to the expeditious response and coordinated efforts of multiple agencies that responded and assisted. We greatly appreciate the assistance of the Illinois Wisconsin Search and Rescue Dogs team. Please express my personal thanks to Officer Johnson and Officer Donohue and K-9 Bundo."

Dear Officer Fernandez,

June 20, 2011

Thank you so much for coming to my rescue yesterday afternoon when I was lost in what I think was Glen Ellyn. The night before, Saturday, my daughter had driven me to visit her apartment in Elk Grove Village when we encountered a street festival of some kind that made us take a different route which was unfamiliar to me. She drove us back home as I don't drive in the dark. Sunday morning before leaving for my church, which happens to be a few blocks from her apartment, I called the non-emergency number for the Elk Grove Village Police to find out if there were still festivities in town that might interfere with my normal route. I was told yes, so I took a substitute route which I had used once or twice. However, I got sidetracked on my way back, turning the wrong way on Devon which would have led me to Arlington Heights road—if it had been the RIGHT way. Due to my short-term memory loss, I wound up two or three hours later in Glen Ellyn, having turned the wrong way several times. Thanks to the Burger King employee who let me use his cell phone to call home, I was able to get back to Hoffman Estates without undue distress, and fortunately you brought along my good neighbor Vince Soliz to drive my car. I know I couldn't have made it back on my own. I regret that my

daughter had to undergo so much worry before she called the Hoffman Estates Police. Your quick action brought very satisfactory results, and I appreciate it greatly.

June 2011

Prevention and Wellness

HHS, in conjunction with Life Source Blood Centers, held the annual spring employee blood drive on June 10, 2011. The turnout for the drive was excellent. Twenty nine employees donated; these donations can potentially save the lives of 87. All participants received a continental breakfast and complementary T-shirt.

Audra Marks and Janice Weinstein, Psychology Interns, conducted one follow-up session of "Hold Me Tight" couples' workshop. The focus of the workshop is to help couples build more intimate and long lasting relationships.

In an effort to assist residents in the community who suffer from chronic pain and illness Audra Marks, Psychology Intern, hosted a two workshop. Chronic pain includes, but is not limited to, migraines, stomach pain, arthritis, TMJ, muscle pain, post-Cancer treatment pain, fibromyalgia, back pain, IBS, and neck pain. Many who suffer from chronic pain may experience loneliness, feeling misunderstood, cancelling plans, sadness, and reduced physical fitness The workshop focused on helping attendees live with chronic pain, manage expectations and grieve lifestyle changes associated with chronic pain, and helping loved one understand the nature of their illness. The first event was held at the Schaumburg Barn (45 participants) on June 13, 2011 and the second at Village Hall (16 participants) on June 15, 2011.

Nursing staff provided the following preventive health services: one children's health clinic, one infant health clinic, one vision and hearing screening clinic, three Cholestech clinics, seven TB testing/adult immunization clinics, and four employee health clinics (including hepatitis vaccinations). New this month, staff also provided one Adult Health Clinic at the Willow Creek Food Pantry.

HHS staff, in conjunction with the Hoffman Estates Park District, began staffing Vogelei Teen Center. The teen center provides a safe environment for youth to gather during the afterschool hours. At Vogelei, teens can shoot pool, play ping pong, play video games, watch television, socialize, and participate in open discussion groups.

Treatment and Crisis Response

Currently HHS' counseling staff is providing mental health services for 67 clients. Additionally, seven intake appointments were completed for June. The Department continues to average two – three intake assessments each week.

HHS is a designated site for individuals to apply for the Nicor Gas Sharing program. The program provides payment assistance with gas bills for those who qualify and meet income requirements; three residents requested assistance during the month.

HHS continues to volunteer for the Salvation Army and provide Salvation Army Emergency Assistance to Hoffman Estates' families in need. Salvation Army funding is available to assist Hoffman Estates residents who are experiencing a temporary or unexpected financial crisis. This fund provides limited financial support to families who show a financial need due to an unexpected emergency (i.e. insufficient funds for rent or past due utility bill). Staff meets with each client for approximately 45 minutes to assess the need for additional services. During the month, six residents requested and received financial assistance via the Salvation Army Support Program.

FIRE DEPARTMENT MONTHLY REPORT JUNE, 2011

This month's activities resulted in the Fire Department responding to 429 calls for service, 274 incidents were for emergency medical service, 131 incidents were suppression-related and 24 were mutual aid to other fire departments.

The following were significant responses during June 2011:

Emergency incidents of interest:

06/05/11 - #1002465 - 1877 Banbury Drive, Inverness - Code 1 (EMS)

District 23 responded on a mutual aid request to Inverness for a 3 year old drowning. Upon arrival patient was out of water and CPR was started. District 23 crews completed ALS care for the patient. The patient was moved to Palatine AMB 82 and transported to NWCH with three men; one Hoffman Estates Paramedic went with and ran the call. This call involved three Fire Departments working together (Palatine, Palatine Rural, & Hoffman Estates) due to the excellent care and professionalism under a very stressful incident the child was given the greatest possibility of survival.

6/22/2011 #1102719 I90 (ACEN)

Engine 22, Squad 22, Ambulance 22, Engine 24, Ambulance 24, and Battalion 6 responded to the I-90 for the accident with entrapment. Upon arrival to the scene, E22 staged approximately 125 feet from the crash scene and began to set up for extrication operations. E22 gave a size up of one person in the car with heavy damage.

Squad 22 was ordered to set up for extrication operations, and staged downstream of the incident. An IL Department of Transportation sign board vehicle had staged behind Engine 22 to assist with shutting down traffic in the two interior lanes of the highway. Ambulance 22 and Ambulance 24 were ordered to work together for a rapid extrication of the patient from the vehicle.

Walk around of the vehicle showed no immediate threats to EMS personnel. Engine 24 was ordered to move into a more protective blocking position by Battalion 6. Battalion 6

James H. Norris VILLAGE MANAGER took command of the incident from Engine 22. The patient was removed from the vehicle and placed into the care of Ambulance 22 with Ambulance 24 assisting.

IDOT blocked off the remaining lanes with cones during the operations. IL State Police were also notified to the scene by Northwest Dispatch. The patient was transported to the hospital with personnel from both Ambulances 22 and 24. Battalion 6 then organized all remaining personnel to search the ditch adjacent to the roadway because of two child booster seats found in the car. No other patients were found from the accident. The patient was extricated and transported to the nearest Level One Trauma Center, Lutheran General Hospital in Park Ridge

Battalion 6 returned all remaining companies. Personnel from Engine 24 returned the abandoned Ambulance 24 to station 22. Ambulance 24 was then manned by other personnel still at the station performing other duties.





Dear Chief Gorvett,

I am writing this letter regarding an incident that occurred on June 5th, 2011. On that day, Engine and Ambulance 23 responded to a call for a possible drowning in our District. Our ambulance and engine were on a call when this second call was dispatched. Upon my arrival, I found our engine crew had completed their earlier assignment and was performing CPR on a three-year old male. Due to the nature of the call, both your Department and the Palatine Fire Department also responded to the scene.

As the Incident Commander, I was truly impressed by the professionalism that the Hoffman Estates FD members exhibited, considering the stressful nature of this call. I would like to point out that your Department's FF/PM Jacob Szafranski did an excellent job on this call. He took control of the patient's airway and directed other paramedics as to the steps that needed to be handled. He was calm and focused, which I feel allowed all others on the scene to remain in that same mode.

Seeing the three departments working together on this traumatic call truly reinforces the importance of mutual and auto-aid agreements, as well as the need to train together.
